

#### INTRODUCTION

The publication of this report is required by law, and the data and information presented represent the best effort that one year's time and a limited appropriation would permit.

The list of mining companies and prospects contained in this report is by no means complete. Some companies have been omitted, and very few prospects are included. The companies that are omitted have only themselves to blame for not complying with the State mining, blue sky and corporation laws. The failure to list prospectors was due solely to lack of information. The inspector would be greatly assisted in his work, and it would result to the benefit of those concerned if the delinquent companies would put themselves in good standing, and if the prospectors would submit complete information on their properties to the inspector's office.

It will be noted that there are no discussions on geology, either general or economic, contained in this report. In the past it has been customary for the mine inspector to include these discussions, but the act creating the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology made it the duty of the bureau to conduct geological and economic investigations and to publish bulletins and reports on these investigations. This work has been in progress for three years; four bulletins have been issued, and additional ones will be published during 1922.

The information being furnished by the bureau, and the large amount of data on Idaho's geology and mineral resources which has been published by the United States Geological Survey, the United States Bureau of Mines, various journals dealing with mining and geology, and in all former reports issued by the inspector of mines, constitute a wealth of existing information. This material is widely scattered, and the bibliographies compiled on it have all appeared in technical publications that are not extensively distributed. These bibliographics are no longer up-to-date and are arranged to meet the requirements of the technical investigator, so are of but little value to the nontechnical man, who has seldom, if ever, heard of them. The many inquiries for this information that have come into this office show that there is a large demand and an urgent need for these references. Realizing this demand and knowing that it will be of immeasurable value to the investigator and the State a bibliography of publications dealing with the geology and mineral resources of each county has been included. This compilation is not absolutely complete nor does it refer to all publications issued, but it does contain sufficient references to satisfy the requirements of the investigator. It is arranged in a nontechnical manner so that it may be of value to everybody.

In compiling the bibliographies the information contained in Bulletin 166, U. S. Bureau of Mines (in cooperation with the University of Idaho), A Preliminary Report on the Mining Districts of Idaho, by Thomas Varley et al., and Bulletin 507, U. S. Geological Survey, the Mining Districts of the Western United States, by James M. Hill, was used, and to these publications credit is given. Many of the publications cited are out of print and can only be consulted at large public libraries. However, practically all of those issued by the United States Geological Survey and the United States Bureau of Mines and most of the mining journals are in the mine inspector's library.

This library is the largest one of its kind in southern Idaho; it is open to the public, is filling a long-felt want and is in continual use. During the year over 2000 separate volumes were acquired. The library represents one of the important new features added to the office, and it could not have materialized without the consistent effort, hard work and many courtesies extended by the Hon. Burton L. French, M. C., in obtaining and having bound numerous government publications. The donations made by the Idaho Supreme Court, Raymond Guyer, Mining Engineer, Spokane, Washington, Charles W. Harkinson, Mining Engineer, Boise, Idaho, and Stewart Campbell include many publications which are of great value as they could not have been obtained elsewhere.

In addition to the five principal metals, practically all other metal and nonmetal products in use are found in Idaho. A great many of these are of commercial importance and are being developed; others are attracting attention from prospectors and are being sought. In the past it has been almost impossible for the people interested to find a market or purchaser; and as there was no general source available where this information could be obtained, a list of the purchasers or users in the United States of the following products was prepared:

Antimony; Asbestos; Barytes; Bauxite (aluminum); Bismuth; Cadmium; Chromium (chrome ore); Cobalt; Diatomaceous Earth; Feldspar; Fuller's Earth; Graphite; Gypsum; Magnesium; Magnesite; Manganese; Mica; Molybdenum; Monazite; Nickel; Platinum; Pumice; Radium; Silica Sand; Sodium; Talc; Tin; Titanium (rutile); Tripoli; Tungsten; Uranium; Vanadium.

The minerals are listed separately, and the list of purchasers of the particular mineral in which one is interested is furnished on a request to the office. The compilation of these lists required considerable work, and it was not completed until October 1, at which time notices were given to the press that it was available. Requests immediately began to pour in; and the addition of this new feature to the office has proven to be a success, and it is very materially assisting in promoting the State's mineral resources.

Idaho's area is 83,888 square miles, which is almost equal to that of Pennsylvania and Ohio combined. The State is approximately 486 miles long and 312 miles wide at its southern end. It contains 44 counties, 30 of which can be classified as mining counties, although only 26 have mines of any importance. As these counties are widely separated, and the State is intricately divided by high mountain ranges and deep canyons, particularly the Salmon River Canyon, a large amount of time and travel is required to visit all of them, so the visit to each one is necessarily very brief. These short visits are insufficient to enable the inspector to keep in touch with all of the mining activities of the State, yet it is expected that he do so. Accordingly the inspection work has been supplemented by gleaning from the press all the information possible. As the maintenance appropriation is insufficient to permit the office to subscribe for all of the newspapers of the State, it was necessary to ask for complimentary copies. These greatly assisted the inspector, the hearty cooperation of their editors is appreciated; and the State of Idaho, through the mine inspector, extends its thanks to the following:

#### GENERAL CONDITIONS.

The Idaho mining industry, which has turned out products having a total value of over \$925,000,000, began in 1860 with the first discovery of gold in the placer mines of the Pierce City district, Clearwater County. Of this total mineral production the larger part is credited to lead, silver, gold, zinc and copper; but the mines have also produced antimony, bismuth, tungsten, cobalt, nickel, molybdenum, quicksilver, barytes, mica, sulphur, asbestos, phosphate rock, coal, salt, building stone and limestone.

Before the war Idaho's annual production of the five principal metals was approximately \$24,500,000, with gold averaging about \$1,200,000. During the war there was a large increase in the production of lead, silver, zinc and copper, owing to the high prices of these metals; while there was a corresponding decrease in the production of gold; as this metal did not increase in value and the cost of production increased so greatly that practically all gold mining companies were compelled to suspend operations. This situation is well shown by noting that in 1917 the total mineral production was \$54,845,153, of which \$804,809 was gold; an increase of over 100 per cent in lead, silver, zinc and copper, and a decrease of over 60 per cent in gold.

After the war the decime in prices and market demand, combined with the excess profit tax, high freight rates, cost of commodities, and high wages, had such a demoralizing effect on mining that the State experienced the greatest depression it has known for over 20 years. This depression is reflected in the mineral production of 1921, which was approximately one-fourth that of 1917. This large decrease in production is attributable to the suspension of operations by four large lead producers and all of the copper and zinc producers because of the adverse conditions mentioned. But during 1921 the excess profit tax was repealed, a substantial reduction in freight rates was made, and the prices of metals were increasing, so that the closing months witnessed the approach of normal conditions under which profitable production can be maintained. This relief permitted the copper mines to open up, and an early resumption of operations by the large lead and zinc producers is anticipated.

The prospecting and development work that has been done in Idaho's mining districts has proven that there are a great many wonderful opportunities in the State. These possibilities are being investigated and developed, new companies are being formed to operate them, the mining spirit has returned, industrial and general conditions are improving, the price of silver will remain at a dollar an ounce for at least three years, the investing public is beginning to realize that gold mining companies are exempt from the provisions of the income tax law, mining is experiencing a revival, and 1922 will probably show a complete recovery.

The mining industry of the State is suffering greatly from the effect of illegitimate promotions and mismanagement, and of the two, illegitimate promotions with their fraudulent literature are doing the greater harm. This literature is designed to mislead and to convey ideas which generate hopes that can never be fulfilled. Undertakings financed through these means are generally of short life, and the temporary benefit derived is of no value, as the great harm lies in the fact that the investor does not condemn the promoter or the property, but lays the blame entirely upon the State and its possibilities. The reaction is such that it is almost impossible to finance a legitimate proposition unless the same means are resorted to by the honest promoter or owner, and rather than lower himself in such a Way many properties that are worthy of development are lying dormant awaiting a time when they can be promoted upon their merits.

The proper management and direction of the operation and affairs of a mining company require more good judgment, coupled with business and technical ability, than any other business undertaking. The men who are holding the executive offices of every dividend paying mine in the State did

not acquire their positions overnight, but through long years of hard work and association with mining, coupled with technical training, natural business ability and honesty. Where the management does not lie in the hands of a technically trained man, his knowledge and judgment are such that he realizes the importance of this training and surrounds himself with a competent staff. If the investing public would realize that these requirements are necessary for a successful undertaking, the popular belief that mining is a gamble would be without foundation, because when a property is properly equipped with intelligence and honesty the proportion of failures in mining is far less than in any other business undertaking; since an honest management will not permit the expenditure of money on worthless property, and modern methods and improvements in mining and metallurgy eliminate many doubtful features.

#### MEN EMPLOYED, WAGES AND ACCIDENTS.

It is practically impossible to obtain complete and accurate statistics of the number of men employed in the mines of the State, as a great many are employed by prospectors and small companies that do not report to the inspector of mines, and the companies reporting continually vary as to the days in operation and the number employed. It was necessary, therefore, to estimate the total men employed. This was done by proportioning time and days operated by reporting companies into a yearly average and adding an estimate, based on reasonable calculations of all nonreporting operators. This estimate gives an average total of 4750 men employed in full time work for 1921 as against an estimate of 4800 for 1920.

The wage scale was practically the same at all mines throughout the State, with 1920 rates in force until May 31, when the scale was cut, as follows: miners, \$4.25; millmen, \$4.25 to \$4.75; mechanics, \$4.75 to \$5.25; and laborers, \$3.75 per day; with board and room averaging about \$1.25 per day.

No big mine disaster occurred during the year, and practically all of the 12 fatal accidents and 946 minor ones can be attributed to the carelessness of the persons involved. The mine inspector's appropriation is not sufficient to hire the assistance necessary to carry a complete and accurate tabulation of all accidents, and as such a tabulation would be a partial duplication of the work of the industrial accident board, no such record was kept, but the files of the board were used in the tabulation of the minor accidents. Since the board's records do not comply with the classifications made by the U. S. Bureau of Mines, due allowance will have to be made for discrepancies in classifications. It will be noted that of the total of 946 minor accidents, only 26 were permanent partial disabilities, 374 involved a loss of time of more than 14 days, and 546 involved a loss of time of less than 14 days. It has always been a question as to whether a mishap causing a loss of time of less than 14 days should be considered an accident; however, these have been so classed and are included in the tabulation.

Twelve fatal accidents out of an average total employment of 4750 men represents a loss of 2.52 men per thousand during the year as against an estimated loss of 3.3 men per thousand in 1920.

#### NOTES ON FATAL ACCIDENTS

February 4, Shoshone County. Joseph Langevin, age 59, single (widower), laborer on mill repairs, and his two sons were moving the base casting of a compressor along the floor in the mill. Deceased was using a crowbar to pry the casting forward. The crowbar slipped and the end in his hands came in contact with a motor driven belt. The point of the bar struck him on the neck, knocked him against the casting, and broke his neck.

February 28, Shoshone County. Frank Sikkerman, age 28, single, miner, had trouble spitting holes, remained too long, and was instantly killed by the blast.

April 2, Shoshone County. James Bones, age 39, married, miner, fell 80 feet from a ladder while going down a raise, and died from the resulting injuries. It is supposed that the powder smoke at the top of the raise had not been entirely removed, that deceased remained in the gas too long and was overcome while descending the ladder.

July 12, Shoshone County. Henry G. Parry, age 41, single, miner, was working for lessees in a small new stope. While mucking and sorting ore a small cave came, followed by a larger one of 5 or 6 tons. Deceased was caught in the cave and crushed to death.

August 18, Gem County. William Kloth, age 29, married, miner, was working in a small shaft. After lighting a round of holes he started up the ladder, but the shots went off before he was safely away, and he was mortally injured by flying rock and the explosion, dying two days later.

August 27, Shoshone County. Oscar Otness, age 24, single, trainman, attempted to couple a single car to the train on the fly and gave two whistles for motorman to come ahead. The motorman could not see the deceased as the entire train was between them, so on releasing brakes, he moved ahead slowly. Deceased failed to couple the cars and was caught between them and a chute. Broken ribs and internal injuries caused his death.

August 29, Bonner County. Mike Skirda, age 35, married, assistant timberman, was assisting in placing a set of timbers near the top of a long raise. This raise was sufficiently covered, below set being placed, to permit execution of work. Deceased went below staging after some tools. Timberman heard a noise and on looking below saw deceased swooning as if from a blow. He hurried below to give assistance, but deceased had fallen before he reached him, A large rock fell from the raise at the time of the accident, and it is supposed that it struck deceased, causing the fall that resulted in death.

September 21, Shoshone County. Wm. Finley, age 25, single, laborer, was dumping cars in a sand bin. A loaded car came down incline to bin at a fast rate of speed. The hoist brakes had been taken up by mechanics the morning of the accident, and when hoist man applied the brake it grabbed tight, causing cable to break. The car went down the incline, struck deceased and threw him from the top of the bin.

September 25, Bonner County. Lester E. Ashby, age 32, single, night shift boss, was supervising repair work in raise. Apparently he lost his footing, and the resulting fall of about 400 feet caused immediate death.

November 4, Custer County. Charles Hendricksen, age 55, single, miner, was sitting on top of a filled stope and evidently leaning against the foot wall. The total distance between the filling and top of stope was about 5 feet. Apparently a single rock fell about 4 feet, striking deceased on the head. The accident happened at the noon hour, and he was dead when found, with the rock lying on his feet.

November 25, Bonner County. H. A. Van Buskirk, age 53, single (widower), miner, was repairing timbering in a raise. This work was started at the upper end of the raise, which was full of broken rock on which the men stood while working. As the work was completed to the level of the rock, the signal was given to trainmen below to draw out the broken rock. After this signal was given, the men on repairs would get out of the raise and wait in a safe place until the rock would recede. The signal was given to draw the rock, and all the men left the raise except the deceased, who sat down on some planks that he placed on top of the broken rock. Two of the men entreated him to get off the rock and sit in a safe place, but he refused. When the rock receded in the raise, it gave way on the side of the chute on which deceased was sitting, causing a hole about 12 feet deep into which deceased slid. Before he could be rescued, the other side caved in, completely covering him up, and death resulted from slight injuries and smothering.

December 16, Shoshone County. Todd Kotum, age 39, single, miner, was assisting timbermen. A large cap timber had been placed upon a staging erected above the floor. When the timber was being lifted to its place on the posts, the staging gave way, causing the deceased to lose his balance and fall. The timber followed, striking him in the back. The accident broke his back, and death resulted a few hours later.

#### INSPECTION

During the year 175 mines in 20 different mining counties were visited. No glaringly unsafe practices were encountered, very few improvement orders were issued, and it was observed that the men are beginning to realize the importance of "Safety First." The inspector was heartly received, courteously treated, and willing cooperation was given at all times, particularly by the large operators, who are doing everything possible to make their mines safe.

# ADA COUNTY

Ada County, which is essentially an agricultural county, is the largest producer of building stone in the State. This stone is quarried from Table Rock, the large flat topped mountain overlooking the City of Boise on the east. This stone was used for the construction of Idaho's beautiful Capitol Building and for many other buildings in the city. It is a fine grained, soft, gray sandstone, easily cut and excellently adapted to building purposes.

From the two mining districts in the county, Highland and Black Hornet, a small amount of gold was produced by prospectors during 1921. All of the companies were idle, and, with the exception of one that has been refinanced and which expects to resume operations during 1922, there is no encouraging outlook for the future.

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# ADAMS COUNTY

Adams County, the home of the Seven Devils.

The principal minerals in the order of their occurrence are copper, silver, gold, lead and zinc. This county is destined to become a large producer of copper when the plans of the Idaho Copper Company, Ltd. reach maturity. The development work being carried on by this company has been stimulating to others, and with this encouragement the large copper deposits are beginning to attract attention. The Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology, in cooperation with the U. S. Geological Survey, is making a complete topographical and geological survey of the Seven Devils district, and when these reports are published a great amount of needed and useful information will be available. In addition to the large copper deposits there are numerous gold veins that warrant development. The placer deposits of the Meadows district produced a small amount of gold during 1921, but no effort was made to save the corundum, monazite and gem stones.

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# BLAINE COUNTY

Blaine County, then Alturas, was the first county in the State to produce lead-silver ore. The mines were bonanzas before the discovery of the Coeur d'Alenes, and a continuous production of high-grade lead-silver ore, zinc, gold and copper has been maintained since 1879, the date of the original discovery. In addition to the five principal metals the mines have produced antimony, bismuth, barytes and limestone. The large high-grade deposits of barytes in the Muldoon and Deer Creek districts, which are lying dormant on account of freight rates and prices, will eventually be opened up and contribute largely to the progress of the mining industry in this county.

The Independence mine of the Federal Mining & Smelting Co. maintained a steady production during 1921. This company has been a continuous producer since entering the Wood River section in 1916, and its operation and output have fully demonstrated the possibilities of the county. The production of the Golden Glow Mining & Milling Co., together with that of many small companies and numerous prospectors, contributed materially in placing Blaine County second in mineral production during 1921. The county witnessed more new prospecting, new developments, and the organization of more new companies in 1921 than in any other year since 1893. The principal factor causing this revival is the excellent record maintained by the Federal Mining & Smelting Co., together with the entry of the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co. into the county. Since the actions of the two largest lead producers in the United States are watched by the mining public, the faith they have shown in the Wood River district naturally attracted attention; and this resulted in the many new activities and in the investigation of the county by numerous engineers and geologists. The Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co. has taken the Bullion, Mayflower. Durango, Jay Gould, and Rough and Ready groups under a lease and bond. These properties all have a substantial production record, and are the principal claims of the old Bullion district. The company has built a 7-mile power line from Hailey to Bullion, constructed a complete camp and buildings, and installed modern equipment. Active development work was commenced in the month of June, and has been progressing continuously with a force of approximately 25 men. All of the old companies in the county have been active; and practically all former producers are being opened up and developed by new organizations, or are being investigated by prominent mining interests. ranks of the old prospectors have been increased by the arrival of new ones, and all have been considerably encouraged by the strikes that have been made, which prove that there are still many ore bodies awaiting discovery.

The Muldoon district received considerable attention during 1921. Two new companies operated throughout the year, many of the old properties were under investigation, and a number of discoveries were made by prospectors. The Sawtooth district, which has a record for the production of a large amount of high-grade silver ore, also received considerable attention in 1921.

The new developments have demonstrated the possibilities of the county, and 1922 will probably witness a complete revival of the industry.

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# **BOISE COUNTY**

Boise County, essentially a mining county, is the principal producer of gold in the State. During 1921 the recovery from placer ground was not very large. Many quartz mines were active; and the Gold Hill & Iowa mine at Quartzburg maintained its position as the largest gold producing mine in the State. Extensive development work was carried on by a number of companies; and, with hardly an exception, the results were very encouraging. In addition to gold, both lode and placer, lead, silver, zinc and monazite occur extensively. Monazite is associated with gold in the placer deposits, of which a large area of virgin ground remains. Three companies developing lead-silver deposits, produced a small amount. In the past these metals have never received worthy attention; but they are destined to become an important factor in the near future.

During 1921 many new companies and organizations were formed to operate in this county; some of them have acquired old lode producers, and others placer ground. These large additions and the general return to gold mining should make this county show considerable activity during 1922.

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## **CUSTER COUNTY**

During many years Custer County, essentially a mining county, has maintained its position as the second or third largest mineral producer in the State. The principal minerals, named in the order of their occurrence, are copper, silver, gold, lead, and zinc. Molybdenum, tungsten, quicksilver, manganese, iron ore, limestone and antimony are also found.

This county ranks first in the State in copper production, and is the home of the largest copper mine (Empire at Mackay), and the largest high-grade silver ore mine (Ramshorn at Bay Horse) in Idaho. Conditions prior to and during 1921 were such that copper and gold mining were not profitable, and practically all of the companies suspended operations. This resulted in 1921 showing the least production the county has recorded for a number of years. The approach of normal conditions and the increase in the price of copper during the closing months of 1921 made copper mining again profitable. The Empire mine started shipping in November, many new leases were granted, and the mine is now running at full capacity. Other copper producers anticipate an early resumption, and the revival of the old mining industry has put new life into the county.

As the product of the Ramshorn mine is a silver ore, this company has been able to maintain capacity production. The mine has a large ore reserve, so it will continue to be a producer. The Idaho Mine Development Company, which is operating the old Red Bird mine at Clayton, had a very creditable production of lead-silver ore, which should be exceeded during 1922, as the company anticipates mill enlargements.

The companies mentioned above, together with a few smaller ones, are responsible for practically all of Custer County's production during 1921. It is expected that the 1922 production will be far in excess of that of the past year, as a number of very important new enterprises have been started. Some new properties are being opened up, and old producers are being taken over by new organizations. The county's mineral resources offer many favorable opportunities both to the investor and the prospector; as many properties worthy of development are lying idle, and there are possibilities for discovarias

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## **ELMORE COUNTY**

Elmore is destined to become one of the most important counties in the State through its agricultural and diversified mineral resources. The various minerals are gold (placer and lode), silver, copper, lead, zinc, molybdenum, and diatomaceous earth. Gold is the principal metal in the placer deposits of the Snake and Boise Rivers and in the quartz veins of the Pine, Rocky Bar and Atlanta districts. As gold mining has been practically dormant, this county had a very poor production during 1921. All of the placer mines were idle, and but few of the lode mines were engaged in development work. However, the dredge being built by the South Park Dredging Company, the opening up of two of Atlanta's old producers, the operations at the Franklin mine, and the activities anticipated at Rocky Bar all offer great encouragement for the future.

It seems to be an assured fact that the power line constructed by the South Park Dredging Company from Mountain Home to Featherville will be extended to Rocky Bar and Atlanta during 1922. If this materializes, a revival approaching the old boom days is anticipated; since it will mean the reopening of two of Idaho's famous gold producing camps, which have been dormant for many years because of lack of power.

Many opportunities in gold mining are to be found in other sections of the county. These, in connection with the other metals that are attracting attention, particularly diatomaceous earth, indicate a bright future for Elmore county.

## GEM COUNTY

The Pearl district, once a famous gold producing camp, is located in Gem County. This district and a few undeveloped sections where a small amount of prospecting has been done constitute the mineral districts of this essentially agricultural county.

The principal minerals are gold, silver, lead, zinc and copper, all of which are found in the West View (Pearl) district. The gold occurs in two distinct types of veins, one a free milling quartz, the other a complex sulphide of lead-zinc-iron. ## **IDAHO COUNTY**

Idaho County, the largest county in the State, is bounded on the west by the State of Oregon; on the north by Nez Perce, Lewis and Clearwater Counties; on the east by the State of Montana; and on the south by Lemhi, Valley and Adams Counties. In 1921 the chief industry was agriculture, but for a long number of years gold mining, both placer and lode, was the principal resource. In addition to gold the other minerals are silver, copper, lead, zinc, antimony, tungsten, and monazite, practically all of which are found in the many mining districts of the county; also, asbestos, coal and marble are present in various localities.

During 1921 gold mining was again becoming profitable, and the considerable increase in prospecting, developing, mill and dredge construction, and the organization of new companies manifested a return of this industry, so the poor production record of 1921 should be greatly increased in the future. The ground has been tested and plans completed for two dredging enterprises; two quartz mills are under construction; a number of old producers, who were idle during 1921, contemplate an early resumption; and the increase in production that is possible from some of the operating companies all give a brighter outlook.

Practically all of the copper, lead and zinc mines were idle throughout 1921, but a little development and prospecting was done; however, with conditions approaching normal these resources will soon return to their previous position.

One company was actively engaged in prospecting for coal, and the principal producing asbestos mine was reorganized and started production during the closing months of 1921. These developments, in connection with the opportunities that tungsten, antimony and monazite offer, will add materially to the county's future in mineral production.

There are many properties worthy of development, which will give a handsome return on the money invested, and opportunities without number for the prospectors are to be found in this county.

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## KOOTENAI COUNTY

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## LATAH COUNTY

## LEMHI COUNTY

Lemhi County, essentially a mining county, has maintained its rank as one of the principal mineral producers of the State since the days of the first discovery of gold in Idaho. The most important minerals are gold (placer and lode), lead, copper, silver, zinc, tungsten, nickel, cobalt, molybdenum, manganese and tin. These minerals, the principal deposits in which they occur, and the geography, physiography and general geology of the county are fully described and illustrated with pictures and maps in Geology and Ore Deposits of Lemhi County, Idaho, by Joseph B. Umpleby, U. S. Geological Survey Bullatin 528, to which the reader is referred.

The general depression and adverse mining conditions that existed throughout 1921 had a very serious effect on this county in that gold and copper mining became unprofitable. This caused a suspension of operations by the gold and copper producers, which resulted in the 1921 production being the least that the county has recorded for many years. The greater part of the mineral production was contributed by two gold companies and three lead companies, the balance from small operators and prospectors, with nothing from the copper mines.

The new developments worthy of note are the installation of a copper volatilization process at the Pope-Shenon mine, and the new plant construction of the Montana Mining and Livestock Company, the Idaho Mineral Company, Ltd., and the Blue Wing Tungsten Mining & Milling Company.

The revival in gold mining and the profitable operation of copper mining, together with the general increase in metal prices, is stimulating the mining activity of this county. Many old producers are preparing to resume shipments and development work, old properties are opening up, and numerous investigations and the organization of new companies are under way; all of which will materially assist in the return of prosperity to Lemhi County, the county of many opportunities for the investor and prospector.

## OWYHEE COUNTY

Owyhee County, one of the first and most important mining counties in the State recorded but little activity during 1921. The Banner Mining & Milling Co., Great Western Mines Co., Red Jacket Gold Mining Co., Sinker Tunnel Mining Co., and lessees at the Trade Dollar were the principal operations. The larger part of the work done by these companies consisted of crosscutting, although the Banner and Red Jacket did some drifting that disclosed considerable good ore.

The lessees at the Trade Dollar and De Lamar mines were the principal producers in the county during 1921. Their output, together with a small amount produced by prospectors, represents the entire production of the county.

For many years Owyhee County was the principal producer of high-grade gold and silver ores in Idaho. The history of this county dates back to the late 60's and early 70's. Its active production record was maintained through a long period with a total of many million dollars to its credit. A few years prior to the war saw a secession of activities. This was intensified by the war and reached its low point in 1921. However, the return to gold mining is having its good effect, particularly in the Silver City and De Lamar districts, and the county is again receiving considerable attention.

Owyhee County's numerous square miles of unexplored mountains and its large number of undeveloped prospects offer many opportunities to the prospector and the investor, and its principal minerals, gold, silver, lead, zinc, nitrates, diatomaceous earth and gem stones well warrant development.

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## SHOSHONE COUNTY

Shoshone County lies in the northern part of the State and is bounded on the east by the State of Montana, on the south by Clearwater County, on the west by Latah, Benewah and Kootenai Counties and on the north by Bonner County. It is noted for the famous Coeur d'Alene district which lies within its borders; a district with mythical boundaries, but known throughout the world as the home of a large number of the greatest lead-silver proother mineral resources are, zinc, gold, copper antimony and tungsten, named other mineral resources are, zinc, gold, copper, antimony and tungsten, named in the order of their prominence. The magnitude of the mining industry in Shoshone County can be readily realized on considering that Idaho ranks second in the United States in the production of lead, of which approximately 90 per cent is produced in this county.

The general depression that existed throughout 1921 affected mining more than any other industry and resulted in this county having the least production that has been recorded for many years. The principal factors affecting the industry were, excess profit taxes, high freight rates and low price of metals, which compelled the Hercules, Tamarack-Custer, Gold Hunter, Callahan Zinc-Lead, and Success companies to suspend operations. These suspensions threw a large number of men out of work, as well as causing the low production record.

Depression, however, was not so noticeable in this county as in other counties. The Bunker Hill, Morning, Hecla, Western Union and Caledonia, all large lead producers, maintained capacity production. The Big Creek and Sunshine, principally silver producers, approximately 17 other small producers, and a large number of development companies carried on active work. These activities gave employment to about 2800 men.

Mining, living, sanitary and welfare conditions in the Coeur d'Alene district are almost ideal. The mines are well ventilated and timbered, every safety law and requirement is complied with, safety organizations are maintained by the large operators and every possible precaution that will make the mines safe is taken. Living and sanitary conditions are excellent; many men own their own homes and the boarding houses are well kept and clean. The effort, care and expense to which the large companies have gone in providing modern well-heated change houses, with shower baths, individual wash basins and lockers, in fireproof, well-kept buildings, and the social buildings erected by them, such as the Y. M. C. A. at Kellogg, the Morning Club at Mullan and Hercules Hall at Burke, are sufficient proof that the welfare of the men has been given considerable attention, and are some of the reasons for the large number of contented workmen that is to be found in the district.

The developments at the Galena, Lookout Mountain, Pine Creek and Sidney mines resulted in very gratifying discoveries, as practically all of these are located in sections that heretofore have been considered unfavorable. The new discoveries are of such importance that many opinions and theories have been reversed; active development work has been resumed on many adjoining properties, and in all probability 1921 witnessed the coming in of some new sections in the Coeur d'Alene district. At the property of the Galena Mining Company, formerly called Chicago-Boston, an excellent showing of ore was opened up on the 400-foot level, and during the closing months of the

year it had been sufficiently developed to warrant the assumption that a new producer had been added to the county. The strikes made by the Lookout Mountain Mining Company, Pine Creek Mining & Milling Company and Sidney Mining Company, whose properties are located in different sections of Pine Creek, indicate three new producers in this section. These important developments and the new ore encountered by the Cedar Creek Mining & Development Co., Ltd., and the Independence Lead Mines, Ltd., during the closing months of 1921, all lend encouragement to the future outlook of the county.

The principal new milling plants constructed during 1921 were the east mill of the Bunker Hill & Sullivan M. & C. Co., that of the Sunshine Mining Co., and the enlargements at the Big Creek Mining Co. The most important mining operation started during 1921 was the long cross-cut tunnel from the 2000-foot level of the Hecla to the Star ore bodies. This tunnel will be over 8000 feet in length and the longest one in the world at such a depth.

The settlement of the Star litigation and the commencement of the Star crosscut were the two greatest achievements of the past year; and the most important news affecting the future of the county was the announcement by the Bunker Hill & Sullivan M. & C. Co. that an electrolytic zinc plant would be added to their smelter during 1922.

All of the companies that suspended production conducted active development work throughout the year. This work greatly increased their ore reserves. These ore reserves and the new ore developed by the Bunker Hill, Hecla and Morning place all of the large mines in a strong position, and in such shape that capacity production can be maintained and the county returned to her former production standard when operations are resumed.

The deep developments at all of the large mines have proven the permanence of their ore bodies. The important new discoveries of 1921, and the great number of prospects that are worthy of development indicate that the Coeur d'Alene district is facing many years of continuous and active mining operations.

# VALLEY COUNTY

Valley County, one of the largest counties in the State, contains a larger area, with less population, and more possibilities for mineral development than any other equal area in the United States. 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# PRODUCTION

Conditions which retarded mining during 1921 resulted in a production equalling approximately one-half that of 1920. The low price of lead, zinc and copper was one of the principal reasons that caused several large producers to suspend production, and only the high price of silver prevented other producers of lead-silver ores from closing.

The total value of the lead, silver, gold, copper and zinc mined in Idaho in 1921 was about \$16,564,014.59, a decrease in value of \$14,606,161.00 from that of 1920. Shoshone County produced \$14,594,399.93 or approximately 85 per cent of the total for the State. The other principal counties were Blaine, Custer, Boise and Lemhi named in the order of their production position.

The most significant fact presented by the county totals is Blaine County's position as the second largest producer. It is the first time in over 25 years that Blaine County has gained this distinction; and during the last 16 of these 25 years, with but one exception (1,919), it never exceeded third place, but always held around sixth.

## Gold

The output of gold in 1921 was valued at \$552,938.23 compared with \$485,590 in 1920, an increase of \$67,384.00. This gain is not large, but is important in indicating a return to gold mining, as the increase was not from the large producers but from several new operations.

#### Silver

In 1921 the production of silver was 6,184,989.73 ounces, and in 1920 it was 7,326,794.00 ounces, a decrease of 1,141,804 ounces. The Coeur d'Alene district produced approximately 80 per cent of the total for the State, and as a number of large lead-silver producers in this district were idle the greater part of the year the decrease can be attributed to them. Full credit must be given to the Pitman Act, which fixed the price of silver at \$1 an ounce, for being directly responsible in keeping a large number of the lead-silver mines of the State in operation.

# Lead

The production of lead decreased from 249,609,976 pounds in 1920 to 210,100,194 pounds in 1921, with a value of \$9,559,558.85. The value of the 1921 output based on 1920 prices would have been \$16,808,015.52, a difference, or loss, of \$7,248,456.67, caused by the price of lead, which averaged 8 cents a pound in 1920 and 4.55 cents a pound in 1921.

#### Zinc

Practically all of the zinc produced in Idaho in 1921 was recovered during January and February, and the average price of this metal (5.17 cents a pound) for these months was used in valuing the total zinc output.

The low price of zinc during 1921 compelled all the producers to close. This resulted in a production of 1,818,313 pounds with a total value of \$94,006.78, as compared with 27,932,326 pounds in 1920, valued at \$2,262,518.

# Copper

The output of copper decreased from 2,538,396 pounds in 1920 valued at \$467,065 to 1,380,168 pounds in 1921 valued at \$172,521.00. The decrease was principally due to the low price of this metal, which dropped from an average 1920 price of 17.46 cents a pound to an average of 12.50 cents a pound in 1921. This decrease and the general abnormal conditions compelled practically all of the mines to suspend production early in the year.

#### Statistics

The tabulation of the mineral production is based upon the gross metal content of the mineral shipped. The values were figured from the average New York quotations. These statistics represent the production reported to the inspector's office and are not complete, as a few small producers refused to submit their statements; however, these were unimportant and in all probability will not increase the total for the State over 1 per cent. The reported gold production for the State is within less than 1 per cent of the total but may be in error as to county source, as the gold shipped from the State to U. S. mints was credited to the State as al whole; so it was necessary to do considerable guessing as to the county from which it originated.
