INTRODUCTION

A large number of mining companies and associations refuse to file with the inspector of mines the reports required by law, and many reports that are filed are not complete and clearly show that the law is either disregarded or that the one making the report is not familiar with the affairs of the company or the requirements of the law. That there may be no question about this and that the inspector's position may be fully understood the laws relative to annual reports are quoted below.

IDAHO LAWS RELATIVE TO REPORTS TO INSPECTOR OF MINES

- Sec. 5474, Idaho Comp. Stat. "It is hereby made the duty of the owner, lessor, lessee, agent, manager or other person in charge of each and every mine, of whatever kind or character, within the state, to forward to the inspector of mines at his office, not later than the 1st day of June in each year, a detailed report showing the character of the mine, the number of men then employed and the estimated maximum number of men to be employed therein during the ensuing year, the method of working such mine and the general condition thereof, and such owner, lessoe, agent, manager or other person in charge of any mine within the state, must furnish whatever information relative to such mine as the inspector of mines may, from time to time, require for his guidance in the proper discharge of his official duties."
- Sec. 5319, Idaho Comp. Stat. . . . "The term 'actual mining operations,' within the meaning of this and the following sections, includes the development of production of gas or oil." (As amended by Sess. Laws of 1921, chap. 179, p. 375.)
- Sec. 5320, Idaho Comp. Stat. "All corporations, domestic or foreign, and associations engaged in mining operations within the state, shall during the month of June each year after the passage and approval of this chapter file with the inspector of mines for the State of Idaho, a report which shall be made under oath and shall contain names of each mining claim and the total number of such claims, owned, leased, or otherwise held, forming the basis for the issue of stock certificates, and the number being worked and developed, and the mining district and county in which such property is located; the nature of the title thereof, or interest therein, whether lease holder or otherwise, the character, value and general description of all

buildings, works, machinery and other improvements: the total amount and description of all development work done by such corporation or association; the total sum of money or other valuable consideration given or paid out therefor; the total number of shares or certificates that such corporation or association is by law authorized to issue, and the different classes and the par value thereof; total number of shares of stock certificates set aside by such corporation or association in its treasury to sell or otherwise dispose of for the purpose of working, developing or otherwise improving the property of such corporation or association; the total number of shares of stock or certificates sold and the total sum of money or other consideration received therefor and the number of shares or certificates remaining unsold. All corporations, domestic or foreign, and associations who are not now engaged in mining operations within this state, who desire to engage in mining and mining operations within this state, shall, before engaging in mining and mining operations within this state, make, execute and file such report as is above provided, and such report shall be made and filed by corporations, domestic or foreign, and associations who shall be engaged in mining and mining operations within this state at the time of taking effect of this chapter." (As amended by Sess. Laws of 1921, chap. 123, p. 297).

Sec. 5322, Idaho Comp. Stat. . . . "It shall be unlawful for any corporation or association to refuse, fail or neglect to make, execute, and file the report provided for in section 5320, and upon conviction thereof such corporation or association shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and punished accordingly."

Many inactive mining companies and associations have been failing to file the annual reports as provided by law in sections 5474 and 5320 of the Compiled Statutes. On November 1, 1921, the inspector directed the following inquiry to the attorney general:

"If a mining corporation, domestic or foreign, or an association is holding its organization intact and this organization is holding and controlling mining property in Idaho is such corporation or association engaged in mining operations within the State within the meaning of section 5320, Idaho Compiled Statutes, as amended by chapter 123 of the 1921 Session Laws?"

On November 23, 1921, the attorney general replied:

".... such corporation or association is engaged in mining operations in this state which come within the provisions of said section. The intent of the legislature seems plain that it meant to require all corporations and associations holding mining claims within the State to make reports."

There has been some controversy as to whether a common law trust company is compelled to comply with the requirements of the Blue Sky law. The decision of the supreme court in the case of State v. T. B. Cosgrove (rendered November 6, 1922) settled this question in the affirmative. The Montana Syndicate, a com-

mon law trust company of the State of Montana, sold its units of stock in Idaho without complying with the Blue Sky law. The court held,

"That it is an association within the meaning of said section (5305 as amended Sess. Laws 1921, p. 29) and that the sale of its units was in violation of what is commonly known as the Blue Sky law of this State."

This decision removes all doubt about common law trust companies being required to file reports in the office of the inspector of mines as provided by section 5320, Idaho Comp. Stat., as amended by Sess. Laws 1921, chap. 123, p. 297.

The law and the supreme court decision relative to the filing of annual reports with the inspector of mines by mining companies and associations are clear in their intent, construction and penalties. Failure to file the reports required is a violation of the law and all companies and associations which have defaulted are listed under "Companies Failing to Report."

All companies that have forfeited their corporate charter, and have failed to file their annual report with the inspector of mines have been considered as legally dead; therefore no mention is made of them.

PROSPECTS

The list of prospects contained in this report has been greatly enlarged over that of the twenty-third report. Many of these prospects are worthy of more prominent mention, but as the prospectors failed to submit any facts it is impossible to give further information. If the small mine owner could realize that it would be beneficial to him if he furnished detailed information to the inspector it would greatly assist in displaying the mining possibilities in Idaho, and result in his prospect receiving more attention. The list published in the twenty-third report is the first of its kind ever compiled in Idaho and has proven that the practice is worthy of continuation as it has been a guide to those looking for mines. It was extensively used and in a number of cases resulted in the prospect being examined and a sale made.

The prospectors that submitted reports have been included in the body of this report on the same basis as the reporting mining companies. . . . This policy will be continued in the future.

MINERAL MARKET INFORMATION

The number of requests during 1922 for information on where the uncommon minerals and metals could be sold has proven that the mineral marketing feature added to the office during 1921 is a complete success and is of invaluable assistance in promoting the mining industry of Idaho. BIBLIOGRAPHIES

LIBRARY

The library, which the present incumbent installed during 1921, has been greatly enlarged until at the present time it is one of the most complete mining libraries in the western United States. It now contains practically every publication of the U. S. Geological Survey and U. S. Bureau of Mines as well as the U. S. Mint reports. Numerous volumes published by the geological surveys of other states and many volumes of journals dealing with mining and geology are also in the library.

Excepting a few articles published in old issues of the various journals, everything of importance dealing with the mining industry of Idaho, including geology, mineralogy and mineral resources, is contained in this library. Since the location of the library is such that it cannot be used by many people who desire this information, the practice of loaning the books has been established. In other words, it is a traveling library, and the books are let out or mailed to all responsible inquirers on request. This feature and method of handling has proven to be a great assistance in promoting the mining industry of the state through disseminating the information published.

INSPECTION

During the year practically every operating mine in the State was visited and, as almost every county in the State has either an operating mine or prospects worthy of investigation, a large amount of time and travel was necessary. Over 200 mines and prospects were examined; and compliance with safety provisions, general geological conditions, and possibilities were noted. Practically all of the large operators are maintaining "safety first" organizations and doing everything within their power to make their mines as safe as possible for the men. The safety laws and the laws governing the regulation of mines were so well observed throughout the year that but few improvement orders were necessary. All of the operators manifested a spirit of cooperation, and the incumbent was always courteously received while discharging his official duties.

The law requires the inspector to visit every mining county in the State during each year to inspect the mines for safety and to collect information and statistics relative to mines and mining. These provisions have been complied with during the past biennium, and have resulted in the inspector becoming thoroughly familiar with the mining industry and mining possibilities in the State. Particular attention has been given to small mines and prospects, and to the development of the uncommon minerals, as the future prosperity of the State is greatly dependent upon these.

SCOPE OF MINING INDUSTRY

RETROSPECTIVE

Almost a billion dollars—\$950,000,000 in 62 years; an average of \$15,300,000 a year for the total time or an average of approximately \$24,450,000 a year for the past 20 years—this is the production record of Idaho for the five principal metals; an average annual mine payroll of over \$9,000,000, and a mine tax roll running into the hundreds of thousands of dollars. Surely an industry worthy of consideration when reviewing the resources of Idaho or when studying the causes of the steady, substantial growth that has taken place and is continuing in this great State.

PROSPECTIVE

The mineral wealth of Idaho, which is greatly diversified, consists of practically all of the principal metals used in modern arts and many of the uncommon metals and minerals for which a demand is continually being developed, and gives the State a resource and a basic industry that will add to her prosperity for many generations. The importance and standing of this industry as it is today is but a barometer forecasting the possibilities of the future.

The mine development and plant of the Anaconda Copper Mining Company at Soda Springs constitutes one of the largest industrial installations in Idaho and the largest phosphate rock mine in the United States. Yet, large as it is, it is only as a mere pin prick in the side of an ocean liner when compared with the vast area of phosphate rock in Idaho. This rock is the greatest potential mineral wealth in the State; and estimates by the United States Geological Survey run into billions of tons of available rock; a quantity sufficient to satisfy the demand of the world for generations to come.

The largest lead mines in the world are in Idaho. Conditions are such that one is safe in assuming that others equally as large are yet to be discovered and that many of those under development will become of considerable importance. Lead is a strategic metal. The demand for it is increasing; as well as new uses. No new supply has been discovered in recent years and a future high price is assured. These factors are all a stimulus to the greater expansion of this industry.

Zinc, sister metal of lead, is similarly situated as to distribution, prices and uses, and the expansion of its development will naturally increase with that of lead.

Idaho is an important producer of copper, and the State holds a high position among the ranking states of the Union. The many properties now under development and the numerous discovered and undiscovered veins indicate that this metal will eventually put the State in a higher position and greatly add to its prosperity.

Silver, the second most important metal produced in Idaho, will always keep the State in an enviable position, as this metal is associated with all of the principal metals and its production will increase with the production of the others.

Gold is the most widely distributed rare metal found and produced in the State. Practically all of the placer deposits that could be hydraulicked are exhausted, but large areas suitable for dredging operations are still available and the gold lode deposits in this State offer greater opportunities than those of almost any other State in the Union.

Many of the common and uncommon metals and minerals are being developed, the extensive distribution of which will always be an important factor in and add to the mineral wealth of the State.

RESOURCES

The State of Idaho contains an area of 83,888 square miles. The maximum width at the southern end is approximately 312 miles and the length from the southwest corner to the northwest corner is approximately 486 miles. The State is divided into 44 counties, 36 of which can be classed as having minerals of commercial importance. In 22 of these counties considerable mining has been done, while only 18 have mines of any importance.

In the past practically all mining has been confined to the five principal metals, which are widely distributed throughout the State; but also lying within the borders of the State is a great variety of the uncommon metals and minerals. It is this great diversity of mineral wealth that makes Idaho one of the principal mining states of the Union.

METALS:

Lead

Lead, the principal metal produced in Idaho, is widely distributed throughout the State. It occurs in all the lead minerals, the most important of which is galena or lead sulphide. The principal counties, in the order of their prominence, are: Shoshone, Blaine, Lemhi, Custer, Boundary, Bonner, Boise, Butte and Camas. The importance of Idaho as a lead producing State is shown by the fact that in 1922 her production was a little over one-fourth of the total production of the United States, thus giving her second place; Missouri being first.

Silver

All of the lead, copper, and zinc ores of the State carry a large proportion of silver, so the mining of silver can hardly be separated from that of its associated metals, and naturally its production fluctuates with their production. During 1922 Idaho ranked third in the United States in the production of silver; Utah was first and Montana second. One-seventh of all the silver produced in the United States during 1922 came from Idaho. As stated above silver is associated with all of the lead, zinc and copper ores; and with but one or two exceptions it is not associated with other metals. Its occurrence is such that it is one of the most widely distributed metals produced in the State. The principal silver producing counties are Shoshone, Blaine, Custer, Bonner, Lemhi, Boundary, Washington, Boise, Owyhee, Idaho, Butte, Camas, Valley, Adams and Cassia, named in the order of their prominence.

Copper

Copper, which ranks third in the list of the principal metals produced in Idaho, is found in many widely scattered sections throughout the State. The principal counties that produce this metal, in the order of their importance, are: Custer, Lemhi, Shoshone, Adams, Bonner, Washington, Idaho, Blaine, Butte, Clearwater and Latah. Of these Custer and Lemhi counties produce by far the greater amount, although eventually the large copper deposits of Adams County will make this county one of the largest producers. Practically all of the copper ores carry a large amount of silver and gold, and in some cases the silver content is more valuable than the copper.

Zinc

In a great many mines zinc occurs associated with lead, although there are a large number of mines whose principal production is this metal. Being associated with lead ores and occurring similarly, it is only found in the same counties as those producing lead and in the same ratio of importance.

Gold

Gold is one of the most widely distributed metals in the State, being found associated with practically all of the lead, zinc, copper and silver ores; as well as being found in all of the placer deposits and the gravel bars of the Snake River. It occurs in practically every county in the State, but the following are the most important: Boise, Idaho, Shoshone, Elmore, Lemhi, Custer, Blaine, Owyhee, Clearwater and Valley.

Antimony

Deposits of antimony, principally the sulphide (stibnite), occur in Shoshone, Valley, Blaine, Idaho and Custer Counties. Those in the Coeur d'Alene district of Shoshone County have been extensively developed; a number of mills for the concentration of the ore have been constructed; and in the past a large tonnage has been shipped. The deposits in Valley County contain such a high grade of ore that most of it can be shipped without treatment. During the war, when antimony commanded a high price, a large tonnage was produced and shipped from these mines. In the other counties mentioned many large deposits worthy of exploitation occur, but they have never been developed.

Bismuth

Bismuth, occurring as a sulphide, has been found in Blaine County unassociated with other metals, as well as in association with some of the lead ores.

Cobalt

Cobalt has been found in Lemhi County. During the war when this metal commanded a high price, this deposit was actively developed; a small mill was constructed; and concentrates carrying a large cobalt content were shipped. Cobalt is also reported as having been found in Kootenai County.

Manganese

Manganese occurs in Washington, Shoshone, Butte and Lemhi counties. Some of the deposits carry a high manganese content and others a high manganese-iron content.

Molybdenum

Molybdenum is found in Boundary, Elmore, Lemhi and Idaho Counties occurring as the sulphide disseminated in intrusive rocks and as a molybdate of lead in fissure veins in limestone.

Monazite

Monazite occurs as a placer sand in the gravels of practically all of the gold placer claims in the State. The quantity varies, and in some of the deposits is not sufficient to be of commercial importance. The deposits of Ada, Idaho, Lemhi and Owyhee Counties contain an appreciable amount of this material, and those of Boise and Clearwater Counties are of commercial importance.

Monazite, a golden colored sand, is a phosphate of the cerium metals, one of which is thorium. The high thorium content of the sand found in Idaho gives it commercial importance. The principal use of thorium is in the manufacture of incandescent mantles for gas lighting.

Nickel

Nickel has been found in Lemhi County, and during the war considerable development work was done on the property in which it occurs.

Quicksilver

Cinnabar, the sulphide of quicksilver, has been found in the placer deposits of Custer and Valley Counties and in lode deposits in Valley and Cassia Counties. The quicksilver lode deposits of Valley County have been developed in a small way, and a little quicksilver has been produced.

Tin

The occurrence of tin has been reported in one placer deposit of Lemhi County.

Tungsten

Tungsten is widely distributed throughout the State; and deposits of commercial importance have been found in Shoshone, Lemhi, Idaho, Boundary, Camas and Butte Counties. Those in Shoshone and Lemhi Counties have been extensively developed, while sufficient work has been done on the others to prove their importance.

INDUSTRIAL MATERIALS

Asbestos

Commercial asbestos occurs in two forms: the chrysotile variety, which is adapted to spinning; and the amphibole, which is not adapted to spinning, but is used extensively in insulation, shingles, paper stock, wall plaster, and cements. The amphibole variety of asbestos occurs extensively in Idaho County, and deposits containing chrysotile have been reported from Teton and Fremont Counties.

Barytes

Large commercial deposits of barite are found on Deer Creek near Hailey and in the Muldoon section in Blaine County.

Bauxite

A large deposit of bauxite on Mink Creek, Bannock County, has recently been reported.

Building Stone

Sandstone excellently adapted to building purposes is found in Ada and Cassia Counties.

Coal

Bituminous coal of commercial importance occurs in Teton, Bonneville and Fremont Counties. The deposits in Teton County have been developed in a small way. Lignite is found in Cassia, Boise, Owyhee, Washington, Idaho, and Clearwater Counties.

Diatomaceous Earth.

Extensive beds of a pure white chalky appearing mineral closely resembling diatomaceous earth are found in Elmore, Camas, Payette, Washington, and Owyhee Counties.

Limestone

Limestone is found in a large number of counties. It has been commercially developed in Butte and Bonner Counties, and deposits of equal importance are found in Bannock and Blaine Counties.

Mica

Mica is found in Latah, Adams, and Idaho Counties. The mica mines in Latah County have produced a large amount.

Mineral Waters.

Hot springs occur at a great many places throughout the State; their waters are excellently adapted to health and pleasure purposes. The mineral waters of Caribou County are particularly efficacious from a therapeutic standpoint.

Phosphate Rock

Immense beds of phosphate rock are found in southeastern Idaho, particularly in Bear Lake, Caribou, Bannock, Bonneville, Bingham, Fremont, and Teton Counties.

Salt

The pioneers evaporated the brine from the salt springs of Caribou County, and the salt was transported to all of the northwestern states before the advent of the railroad. Caribou is the only county in the State where salt of commercial importance occurs.

Sulphur

Extensive deposits of native sulphur occur in a number of places in Caribou County.

Oil and Gas

Structures favorable to the accumulation of oil and gas in commercial quantities are found in Caribou, Bonneville, Teton, and Bear Lake Counties. Gas has been developed in Payette and Washington Counties; and a small amount of drilling has been done in Owyhee, Washington, Payette, Cassia, and Power Counties.

PROMINENT 1922 ACTIVITIES

Mining, excepting for gold, experienced a revival during 1922. Many properties that had been idle during the previous year resumed operations. There was a large increase in production; number of men employed; new companies formed; prospectors; and investigators looking for properties. The factors responsible for this improvement were the gradual return of the country to normal business conditions; the marked increase in the price of lead, zinc and copper; the Pittman Act; and the reduction in freight rates.

The principal new developments of the past year that promise to be permanent can best be outlined by reviewing generally the largest mining counties.

ADAMS COUNTY

The Idaho Copper Co., Ltd., continued active work in further prospecting the large mineralized zone in the famous Red Ledge group, which promises to give Idaho a large producing copper mine. Three companies developing the high grade silver-copper deposits on Indian Creek disclosed important showings. One of these, the Azurite Mining Co., rehabilitated its mill, added new equipment, constructed a small hydroelectric power plant, and commenced production. The high grade gold deposits recently discovered on Cuddy mountain were actively developed as were also the mica deposits on Council mountain.

BEAR LAKE, CARIBOU AND BONNEVILLE COUNTIES.

Practically all of the phosphate mines were closed throughout the year. The mines that continued operation in a minor way produced a small tonnage. The Anaconda Copper Mining Co, continued construction work and mine development; and is now in a position to maintain capacity production whenever conditions justify. The Wallace-Wyoming Oil Co., operating in one of the most favorable locations in Idaho, extended its well to a depth of 700 feet. The Caribou Placer Co., Mt. Pisgah district, Bonneville County, a recent entry into Idaho, installed a large hydraulic plant and equipment, constructed a new camp, and is prepared to commence operations early in 1923.

BLAINE COUNTY

During 1922 Blaine County enjoyed the largest mining activity that it has witnessed for many years. Numerous prospectors actively engaged, many discoveries and investigations, and a large increase in the ore reserves of the operating mines were responsible for the growth that has taken place. The Federal Mining & Smelting Co. continued capacity production from the Independence mine, and the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co. maintained active development work at Bullion throughout the year. The principal discoveries and new ore developments in the Hailey section were those of the Consolidated Mascot Mines Corporation, Federal Mining & Smelting Co., Colorado Mining & Milling Co., Utah-Bellevue Mines Co., Mineral Hill Mining & Milling Co., Jack Nelson and Floyd Wilson. The United Mines Co., operating in the Muldoon district, exposed considerable new ore; and one other mine increased its operations. The large high grade deposits of barytes on Deer Creek near Hailey received considerable attention; and one property was pur-

chased by the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co., presumably in anticipation of the construction of its zinc smelter at Kellogg. The most important transaction of the year was the acquisition of the Homestake group on Lake Creek, above Ketchum, by the Mineral Exploration Co., a strong company well financed and directed by prominent mining engineers.

BOISE COUNTY

The activities in this county during 1922 did not meet expectations; but the interest shown in prospecting, and the new developments exceeded that of 1921. Fire destroyed the hydroelectric power plant on the South Fork of the Payette River. While the plant was being rebuilt, the Gold Hill & Iowa was closed down, but, excepting for this loss of time, capacity production was maintained as well as a large amount of exploration work. Although this mine was closed down again in December, the pumps have been kept running. The lead-silver districts were more active than the gold districts, with three companies operating, two of which made some small shipments during the year. The Golden Age Junior Mining Co. has completed plans and commenced construction on a new concentrating mill; and the Mineral Mining Co. built and operated a small testing plant.

BONNER COUNTY

The Armstead success has been a very material factor in stimulating the activities of this county and in causing it to become recognized as a mineral producing county. The mill and plant installation of the Armstead Mines Co. was the largest undertaking started in the State during 1921, and was completed in 1922. The mill was started in March; since then capacity production has been maintained without interruption. This property is now owned by the Talache Mines, Inc., and is the largest producer and dividend payer in the State to come in during 1922.

The Clark Fork district had a revival: the Lawrence Mining & Milling Coresumed operations under lease; the Mimetite made its initial shipment; one company developing a copper prospect was active; and a large amount of prospecting was done in the Cabinet section, with very encouraging results. The Priest Lake district also had a substantial revival; two important ore discoveries were made; and the outlook is much brighter. The Lakeview district had a marked increase in development and in interest shown: The Lakeview Silver Mines Co. is contemplating the erection of a new reduction plant; and after many years of litigation the Supreme Court returned the Webber mine to its original status, and the mine will shortly be reopened. The Pend d'Oreille district recorded a considerable increase in activity, with one company developing a very good showing. The future of this county is very encouraging.

BOUNDARY COUNTY

The Continental Mine, which was idle throughout 1921, resumed operations early in 1922. The mill was rehabilitated, a flotation unit added, and capacity production maintained. This is one of the largest lead producing mines in Idaho, and is a material factor in the prosperity of Boundary County. The Cynide Gold Mining Co. installed a new sawmill, and practically completed the erection and installation of a 200-ton cyanide plant. The Idaho Gold & Ruby Mining Co. completed its plant installation and has promised production in 1923. During 1922 there was a decided increase in prospecting and small developments over the previous year.

BUTTE COUNTY

The principal mining operation in this county is that at the large limestone quarries at Arco, where all of the limestone used in the sugar factories of Idaho and Utah is mined. These quarries employ about 60 men, and a larger tonnage was produced during 1922 than in the previous year. The Wilbert Mining Co. moved its camp, buildings, and equipment to the location of its new No. 4 tunnel, and drove this tunnel over 1500 feet during the year. The Lava Creek and Badger Creek districts had a very marked increase in activities, and a small amount of ore was shipped during the year.

CLEARWATER COUNTY

Only a small amount of placer mining was done. A new hull was constructed for the Bailey Dredge; the equipment was moved from its previous location to Rhodes Creek; and active dredging was started in September. The Bole Consolidated Mining Co. built a new camp, cleaned out the old tunnels and shaft, and commenced active development work. These activities added considerable to the progress of the county over the year 1921.

CUSTER COUNTY

Custer County, the largest copper producing county in the State and one of the important lead producing counties, recorded a substantial revival. All of the producing mines maintained capacity production, and several new companies entered the county during the year. The principal new operators were the Bruno Mining & Milling Co., on Squaw Creek, and J. E. Walker and associates, who acquired the Livingston group. The Idaho Metals Co., operating the Empire Copper mine at Mackay, resumed operations in November, 1921, and maintained capacity production throughout 1922. This mine is operated under the leasing system and is the largest copper producer in the State. The Horse Shoe Copper Co. and the Canady mine, both lead producers at Mackay, had a large increase in production over 1921. The Ramshorn Mines Co., at Bay Horse, one of the largest silver mines in the State, maintained capacity production throughout the year. The Idaho Mine Development Co., operating the Red Bird Group at Clayton, greatly increased its ore reserves and production. The increase in prospecting and development throughout the county was marked and substantial.

ELMORE COUNTY

One of the most important additions to Idaho mining during 1922 was the completion of the dredge of the South Fork Dredging Co., which is operating on the Feather River at Featherville. This installation represents an expenditure of over \$500,000. As Elmore County is chiefly a gold producing county, the other activities did not greatly exceed those of 1921, although there was a slight increase in prospecting.

IDAHO COUNTY

Idaho County, once a famous gold producer, and a county with more gold mining opportunities than any similar area in the United States, recorded a greater activity during 1922 than in the previous year. Although this increase did not meet expectations, the resumption was substantial. The Unity Gold

Mines Co., at Warren, was the largest producer and the most active gold mine in the county. The Homestake Gold Mining Co., at Elk City, had a large payroll and was active throughout the year. The acquisition of the Walker & Wilcox group by E. E. Carter and associates, and the new gold discovery at Dixie, were the two most important events.

LEMHI COUNTY

The disclosures at Silverton, the newly discovered lead district lying east of Salmon; the new ore encountered at Viola and Spring Mountain; and the resumption of operations and continued production at the principal copper and lead mines, were all responsible for the very material increase in activity and production. The Harmony Mines Co., a large copper producer, resumed operations early in 1922. The Pope-Shenon, also a copper producer, was leased to George A. and William M. Snow, who converted the volatilization plant into a concentrator and immediately commenced production. The lead mines at Gilmore—the Latest Out Mining & Smelting Co. and the Pittsburgh-Idaho—maintained capacity production. The return to gold mining did not come up to expectations; however, there was a material increase over the previous year.

OWYHEE COUNTY

Owyhee County, once one of the principal gold-silver producing counties in the State, had a substantial and marked increase in mining developments, new discoveries and investigations. The strikes made by George Westlake and the Never Sweat Mining Co., and the resumption of operations at Demming were the most important events. The Flint mine enlarged its force and completed plans for the erection of a reduction plant. Practically all of the companies that operated during 1921 were active throughout 1922.

SHOSHONE COUNTY

The revival in this county during 1922 was almost complete. All of the mines that were idle in 1921 resumed operation at capacity production, and those that remained in operation increased their output. With every important mine running, a total of over 3600 men on the payrolls, lead and zinc commanding a high price, and dollar silver, conditions could not be much better. Many new discoveries were made in the smaller mines; numerous old prospects were reopened; the Star crosscut is progressing rapidly; Success is staging a come-back; Galena, Lookout Mountain, Big Creek and Western Union are proving to be real new mines; and the new developments on the lower levels of the Bunker Hill, Hecla and Morning give assurance that the life of these mines will extend over many years.

The principal outstanding events of the year affecting mining activities and the future prosperity of the county were as follows:

The settlement of the action brought by the late E. R. Day and Mrs. Sarah E. Smith against the Hecla Mining Co. and Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co., and the subsequent ratification by the Hecla stockholders of the agreement between the Hecla and the Bunker Hill for the purchase and operation of the Star mine.

Continuous work on the Star crosscut, which was extended to over 5100 feet in length.

Discovery of a large vein on Kellogg Peak parallel to the famous Bunker Hill vein, and on Bunker Hill and Sullivan ground. Discovery of a new ore shoot in the Success mine.

Increase in size and value of Hecla ore bodies on lower levels.

Resumption of operation by Hercules, Tamarack & Custer Consolidated, and Callahan Zinc Lead companies.

Reduction in freight rates.

Bunker Hill Smelter contracting its entire lead output for a period of five years to the St. Joseph Lead Co.

Increase in wages, plus a 50 cent bonus.

Federal Mining & Smelting Co. sold all of its accumulated zinc concentrates and contracted future delivery.

Consolidation of Galena Mining Co. and Callahan Zinc Lead Mining Co.

Tamarack & Custer Consolidated Co. increased capital stock to 5,000,000 shares and declared a 166 per cent stock dividend.

Hecla Mining Co. paid an additional dividend of \$500,000, making a total of \$950,000 in dividends for the year.

VALLEY COUNTY

This county had a substantial increase in new development and construction over the previous year. The quicksilver mines at Yellow Pine, being developed by the United Mercury Mines Co., were active. A new retort was installed and put into operation; and development in the mine continued throughout the year. The Profile and Deadwood districts had a decided improvement. The event of most importance to the county was the progress of construction work on the new highway from Cascade to Yellow Pine.

WASHINGTON COUNTY

The production, increase in prospecting, and development work in this county during 1922 was practically double that of 1921. Most of the new development was substantial and there is promise of decided improvement in the future.

BLUE SKY

During the past biennium the incumbent has been particularly alert in endeavoring to suppress fraudulent advertising and promotions, as well as closely watching for Blue Sky law violations. The results have been very encouraging and the investing public is beginning to realize the benefit of this watchfulness.

FOREST RESERVE

Practically every acre of land in Idaho that is of value for mining purposes is included within a forest reserve. The past biennium witnessed an active road building campaign throughout a large number of the forest reserves by the Forest Service. These roads are going to be of inestimable value in the development of the mineral wealth of the isolated sections. The road up the South Fork of the Clearwater River into the Elk City, Dixie and Buffalo Hump districts and the one from Cascade into Yellow Pine and Thunder Mountain are both fully justified and badly needed.

The road building campaign undertaken by the Forest Service is commendable, but the attitude of many of the minor officials toward mining and the mining public on the reserves is open to criticism; and this criticism applies particularly to their eagerness to contest and question mineral locations and their refusal to protect from sheep grazing sufficient land for the domestic stock owned by the prospector and those in the small settlements.

MEN EMPLOYED AND WAGES

The year closed with over 6300 men employed; an increase of 1550 over the average number employed during 1921. Of this number 5300 men were listed on the payrolls of reporting companies; a conservative estimate of 1000 has been added to cover the leasers, men employed by the leasers and the small operators that did not report. There has been a large turnover created by the shortage of miners and the reopening of all the mines of the Coeur d'Alene district that were closed during 1921. The extraordinary fluctuations caused by this turnover have made it practically impossible to give the average employed for the year.

The 1921 wage scale prevailed until October 1 when an increase of from 25 to 50 cents per day was made. This increase did not affect shovelers and surface laborers, but did apply to miners. The effect of the increase is certain to be very beneficial. Heretofore, miners and muckers have received the same wage and, rather than to assume added responsibility, miners have all been hiring out as muckers. This new differential in wages is sufficient to attract the men back to the machines, and should eliminate the shortage of miners that existed throughout 1922.

The wage table printed below gives the average wage that was in force throughout the State. When wages were increased on October 1, a bonus of 50 cents per day to all classes of labor was given throughout the Coeur d'Alenes, so it is necessary to add this to the "After October 1st" table for the full wage paid in this district.

Throughout the State, board and room averaged about \$1.25 per day at company boarding houses. Many companies have built houses which are rented to the married men at a nominal amount.

ACCIDENTS

A comparison of the proportion of total accidents with men employed during 1921 and 1922 shows a material decrease. This decrease can be attributed to the safety provisions installed and safety organizations maintained by practically all of the large operators, as well as to their endeavor to make their mines as safe as possible and to the spirit of cooperation and good will that many of them have engendered among the men. The success that is possible from efforts of this kind has been demonstrated by the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co. Its mine is one of the largest lead mines in the world and this company employs a larger number of men under ground than any other company in the State. Its annual production of crude ore is approximately 500,000 tons, from a mine with many miles of underground workings. Considering the magnitude of the mine and the number of men employed, this company has made an enviable record for itself in the past three years. During this time, neither under ground nor on the surface, has there been one fatal accident. Credit for this record is also due to the sustained effort and interest in safety work and alert supervision of the mine superintendent, William McDougall, and his efficient foremen, Zeb White and James Lee. The Hecla Mining Co. is also to be commended for the excellent esprit de corps that exists and the particular attention that is given to safety first.

The minor accidents in the accompanying table, "Classification of Accidents" are taken from the records of the industrial accident board and arranged to comply more nearly with the classifications made by the U. S. Bureau of Mines. This table is somewhat misleading as a very large proportion of the accidents listed under "Over 14 Days" did not greatly exceed this number of days. The majority of those listed under "One to 14 Days" did not exceed seven days, consequently no compensation was paid and these should not be considered as accidents, although they have been listed as such.

During the year there was no large mine disaster and the majority of all the accidents that occurred, both fatal and minor, can be attributed directly to the carelessness of the one involved.

NOTES ON FATAL ACCIDENTS

January 3, Federal Mining & Smelting Company, Shoshone County. Pete Pezzetti, age 40, single, shoveler in mine, was struck by a solid slab of ore which fell from the roof without warning. Evidently the water seepage along a talc slip on the hanging wall caused the slab to loosen and it suddenly dropped.

January 10, Hecla Mining Company, Shoshone County. Jack Sandmo, age 28, single, timberman's helper, was helping timbermen move a heavy cap. The timber slide opening on this floor was about 30 inches wide and was covered securely with 5 foot lagging, leaving over 1 foot of lap at each end of lagging. Sandmo was standing on lagging over slide and had picaroon in cap preparing to move same. When Sandmo and the other men moved the cap it rolled slightly and struck the two lagging which were over the slide and on which Sandmo was standing, knocking them forward and into the slide. Sandmo fell through the hole and dropped seven floors to the safety door over the drift.

March 30, Unity Gold Mines, Idaho County. John Keglan, age 36, single, miner, was working in stope which was filled with muck to within 6 feet of the back. Some ore 6 inches wide which had been stripped on the hanging wall broke loose, struck him on the back of the head, pinned his head to a timber and killed him instantly.

May 30, Pope Shenon Mining Company, Idaho County. W. L. Thompson, age 48, married, miner, was killed in transformer house. The power was low and he and a companion went to the transformer house to examine the transformers. Thompson walked between the transformer and the lightning arrester. The distance between the two is not over 2 feet. Death was instantanous.

June 21, Gold Hunter Mining & Smelting Company, Shoshone County. Clyde W. Fitzwater, age 37, married, miner, was overcome with gas in a filled stope with cribbed manway and chute from which a raise was being driven to the level above. Fitzwater and companion went up the cribbed manway, covered the opening, evidently not blowing the stope, and went to work sorting and shoveling. In pulling the muck from the raise they evidently released powder fumes from the previous shooting and both were overcome by gas. Fitzwater fell with his face in the gassy muck and was probably dead when found, although the pulmotor was used. The other man fell with face over a crack in the closed manway and recovered.

July 11, Federal Mining & Smelting Company, Shoshone County. Henry Storjohan, age 47, married, hoisting engineer, was caught under cage and died from internal injuries in 12 hours. In order to remove the double deck cage from the shaft opening at the 800 station tunnel level, a short portable track is laid across the shaft opening, resting in grooves provided for the purpose. On this track the truck receiving the cage is run in across the shaft opening and out again on to the station turnsheet. The cage truck is about 1½ feet high and the double deck cage is over 16 feet high to the top of the hood. The upper guide shoe on one side of the cage caught against the shaft timbers as the truck was moving forward into the station from its position in the shaft. Storjohan, observing this, picked up a handy pevy to pry the cage loose from the side where it was caught. The cage came suddenly loose, over-balanced and toppled over forward. Storjohan was caught under the cage as it fell forward and suffered a fractured skull, broken leg and internal injuries.

July 23, Federal Mining & Smelting Company, Shoshone County. Patrick Ryan, age 50, single, shoveler, coming on shift at about 3 p. m. went in where day miners were loading the holes at the west face of drift. He then went into east face some 350 feet east, knowing the miners were preparing to blast and were going off shift. The miners lighted their fuses and went down the raise to the level. Ryan, evidently forgetting himself, went back, passed the raise into the west end again, and got about 50 feet from the face when the shots commenced to go. He suffered a compound fracture of the right femur, developed tetanus July 31, and died August 1.

September 19, Hercules Mining Company, Shoshone County. John A. Murphy, age 42, single, miner, was struck by a slab falling from the hanging wall. Murphy and his partner had been barring on this slab all morning, as they were mucking back the broken rock that was piled around it. After most of the broken rock had been removed, Murphy struck the slab with a pick, causing it to fall and pin him underneath. He was instantly killed.

September 23, Gold Hill & Iowa Mines Company, Boise County. Nels Mathison, age 68, single (widower), mucker, fell from chute on 23d floor of a stope. It is not known exactly how the accident happened, but it is believed that Mathison stood on a cracked lagging that broke, dropping him to the floor below from which he rolled into an unfinished chute which was open on three sides. Death was instantaneous.

October 9, Federal Mining & Smelting Company, Shoshone County. Jack Hany, age 42, single, miner, was struck by an angular wedgeshaped piece of ground which fell from between two talc slips. Hany had barred down all the back that appeared to be loose, but was not satisfied to leave it without spraging. He was walking in on the hanging wall side with a sprag that he intended to put in on the foot wall side when the ground fell and caught him.

October 31, Hercules Mining Company, Shoshone County. Michael E. Welsh, age 53, married, mine foreman, was injured while on jitney cage about 10 feet below 800 level. It is not known exactly how the accident happened, as he was alone at the time. There were five lengths of 2-inch pipe about 12 feet long on the cage with him. It is supposed that either he let the pipe get away from him, allowing it to catch the timbers in the shaft, thus causing the cage to stop suddenly, which threw him against the timbers, or that he had an attack of dizziness (of which he had complained that morning as well as several days before), causing him to fall out and strike his head on the shaft timbers, and at the same time knocking the pipe out of the cage against the shaft timbers, thus stopping the cage suddenly. He died while on the way to the hospital.

November 4, Tri Metals Milling Company, Shoshone County. Burt Hartwell, age 47, mill shift boss, coming down the mill stairs, slipped and fell, hitting on his back and head. Upon recovering consciousness, although feeling ill, he insisted upon working the shift out. He came down to work the following night, but an hour later was compelled to return home. He died November 7.

November 6, The Amalgamated Sugar Company, Butte County. Dan W. Hurst, age 75, single (widower) rock breaker, was loading rock in mine car at the foot of an incline and about 30 feet from a vertical ledge of rock, when about 25 to 50 tons of rock gave way from top of ledge which was about 50 feet high. One of the men saw the rock as it gave way and yelled a warning to the others. Other men working with him heeded the warning and ran to safety. Hurst did not run at once, but looked all around first. He first saw the oncoming rock as it struck a bench at the top of the incline, and then ran to the end of his mine car, apparently thinking himself in the clear. He stopped and looked back, and as he did so was struck by the smaller fragments of rock from the slide and was crushed against the small mine car.

December 21, The Callahan Zinc Lead Company, Shoshone County. Alex Stod, age 33, single, Cager, was on cage conveying a load of air drills. Evidently drills were not securely fastened and they tipped over, throwing Stod between cage and shaft timber, from which position he was thrown between cage and wall and landed in the sump.

ADA COUNTY

The principal mineral resources of this county is the excellent quality of building stone that is quarried from Table Rock mountain. This stone is a soft fine grained sandstone, easily cut and excellently adapted to building purposes, and has been used extensively in the State Capitol Building and many of the buildings of Boise.

Other than a small number of prospectors in the Black Hornet district all of the lode mines were idle throughout the year. Many excellent veins are to be found in this district and considerable development work and mill construction has been done in the past, all of which was on the assumption that the ore was a free milling gold. At a few feet in depth the sulphide zone was encountered, so practically all of the ventures proved failures. Under modern metallurgical methods and proper direction many of the deposits in this district present favorable opportunities.

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ADAMS COUNTY

Adams County, the home of the Seven Devils, is destined to become one of the largest producers in the State, the principal minerals being copper, silver, gold, lead, zinc and mica. The famous Red Ledge group, being developed by the Idaho Copper Co., Ltd., is standing up in excellent shape under the development work that was done during the year. A large tonnage of ore has been proven and the company expects to start its operating tunnel from Eagle Bar on the Snake River in the near future. When this tunnel is completed and plant installed it will represent a very large expenditure. A number of smaller companies and prospectors were engaged in developing their copper prospects throughout the year.

The high grade silver-copper deposits on Indian Creek were under active development in 1922. Three companies operating in this section have an excellent showing. Under proper direction these silver deposits will become a material factor in the mineral resources of this county. The high grade gold deposits recently discovered on Cuddy Mountain were actively developed during the year. The extensive prospecting and new development work that was done in this vicinity resulted in very encouraging showings and considerable activity in the near future is anticipated. A number of prospectors were busily engaged throughout the year in developing the mica deposits on Council Mountain. Commercial mica has been exposed in some of the prospects and one is safe in assuming that this resource will eventually add to the activities of the county.

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BLAINE COUNTY

During 1922 Blaine County enjoyed the greatest mining activity that it has witnessed in over 30 years. This revival was not a boom, but a strong consistent growth stimulated by many new discoveries, new companies entering the county, an increase in the number of prospectors, and a large increase in the ore reserves of the old operating mines, all of which is attracting the attention of the mining public, which is again investigating the many possibilities to be found throughout the vast mineralized sections of the county.

This county, then Alturas, was the first in the state to produce a high grade lead-silver ore, and since the first shipments of 1880 has always been a consistent producer, though somewhat limited during the past few years. In addition to these high grade ores, zinc, gold and copper are widely distributed throughout the county, as well as barytes, bismuth and limestone. Of the latter, barytes is by far the most important, and the prediction made in the 23d annual report that "The large high grade deposits of barytes in the Muldoon and Deer Creek districts. which are lying dormant on account of freight rates and prices, will eventually be opened up and contribute largely to the progress of the mining industry in this county" is coming true. One of the barytes properties located on Deer Creek is involved in litigation, and the other has been purchased by the Bunker Hill & Sullivan M. & C. Co., presumably in anticipation of the construction of the company's zinc smelter at Kellogg. Since acquiring this deposit considerable development work has been done, the ground is being patented, and a shipping lease has been let to a Seattle company which contemplates a substantial production during 1923.

Blaine County offers many opportunities to prospectors and development companies and is one of the few counties in the State where immediate results from new ore are possible. The principal new discoveries during the year are as follows: The Consolidated Mascot Mines Corporation, which is operating at the head of the East Fork of Wood River and developing a group of properties with a good record of past production, exposed a very creditable showing. The Mineral Hill Mining & Milling Company, a new organization, which did not enter the county until late in the fall, has been developing an excellent showing of leadsilver ore. Jack Nelson, who has been working the Homestake group on East Fork, which adjoins the property of the Federal Mining & Smelting Co., encountered a good showing of high grade lead-silver ore. The Colorado Mining & Milling Co., a new entry into Blaine County during 1922, is operating the Compensation group, a good showing of ore was exposed, and one small shipment was made during the year. Floyd Wilson, a farmer, made a small shipment of ore from a ledge he discovered in the vicinity of his ranch. The Plata Corporation, developing the Arizona group which adjoins the Idahoan, made one shipment, installed machinery and started an active campaign. One company operating near Bellevue exposed considerable high grade ore, made two small shipments, and is operating continuously.

The most important event during 1922 was the acquisition of the Homestake group by the Mineral Exploration Co. This company is well financed and is directed by prominent mining engineers. An excellent showing of ore has been developed, and 1923 should witness a new large producer in this county.

The Federal Mining & Smelting Co. maintained capacity production from the Independence group, and in the closing months of the year new ore was exposed which greatly increased the reserves of the company and further proved the persistency of the ore in the Wood River district. The Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining and Concentrating Co. maintained active development work throughout the year, the results of which have been very encouraging. The entry of this company into Blaine County has contributed largely to the increased interest shown.

Two companies were active in the Muldoon district, one of which, the United Mines Co., operating a property in Garfield Gulch, developed a very creditable showing of high grade lead-silver ore. Other than assessment work the Sawtooth district was dormant during 1922.

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BOISE COUNTY

Boise County, the principal producer of gold in the State, is essentially a mining county, the gold being found in both placer and lode deposits. Lead, silver and zinc are also widely distributed throughout the county, as well as monazite, which occurs in the placer deposits. Numerous analyses and determinations made by the U.S. Geological Survey and the Smithsonian Institute on the various minerals and metals contained in the black sands from the placer deposits of this county all record a high percentage of monazite and no platinum. Three companies operating placer deposits did hydraulicking during the high water season. The Gold Hill & Iowa, the largest gold producing mine in Idaho, was active throughout the entire year, excepting while the power plant on Payette River was being rebuilt after it had been destroyed by fire. The Idawa Gold Mining Company and the Monetary Metals Company maintained active development work throughout the year and late in the year the National Mining & Development Company was preparing to resume operations. The activities of 1922 did not meet expectations but the interest shown in new prospecting and new developments far exceeded that of 1921. The principal lead-silver properties are those of the Golden Age Junior Mining Company, which reports a considerable tonnage of ore blocked out and plans completed for the construction of a concentrating mill; the Mineral Mining Company and the Missouri Mining Company, all of which have creditable showings and operated the entire year. The two last named companies each shipped a small amount of ore. The lead-silver deposits, which are widely distributed throughout the county, are destined to become an important factor in its future prosperity.

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BONNER COUNTY

March 23, 1922, is a memorial date for Bonner County, as on that day the first carload of concentrates was shipped from the Armstead mine, thus bringing to a successful termination one of the most remarkable developments in the State and one that put Bonner in a prominent place as a mineral producing county. This achievement is also remarkable in that it is a complete demonstration of the results of intelligent mine management as well as of the possibilities of the county. The Armstead success has also been a very material factor in attracting attention to this county which has resulted in a very large increase in prospecting, development and new companies. The mineral possibilities are holding up under development and with the many new undertakings at present under way the future is indeed very bright. The principal minerals which are distributed throughout the county are high grade silver-copper, lead-silver, zinc, gold and limestone. These deposits offer many opportunities to prospectors and development companies as much of the ore can be shipped without treatment.

The Clark Fork section whose principal ores are lead-silver and copper-silver had a very marked increase in activity over that of 1921. One company was active in developing its copper prospect. The Lawrence Mining & Milling Co. was operated by leasers and the Mimetite group, which adjoins the Lawrence, made its initial shipment.

A large amount of prospecting and some development work was done in the Cabinet section with very encouraging results.

The Priest Lake district showed a very marked increase in activities both prospecting and development. Very encouraging new discoveries were made, and more interest was shown.

The Lakeview district was much more active than in 1921; a large amount of development work was done, and some prospecting, and a small amount of ore was shipped. One company, the Lakeview Silver Mines Co., is contemplating the erection of a reduction plant. After many years of litigation the Idaho Supreme Court has returned the Webber property to its original status. This property is now under investigation and in all probability 1923 will show this old producer again on the active list.

The Pend d'Oreille district has had a marked increase in activity with one company operating and a number of prospectors busy.

The growth in Bonner County has been slow but steady. All of the districts offer many possibilites and it should be but a short time until this county is recognized as one of the principal mining counties of the State.

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BOUNDARY COUNTY

Boundary County is fast coming to the front as an important mineral producing county, its principal resources being lead, silver, gold, zinc, copper, tungsten and molybdenum which are widely distributed throughout the county. The year 1922 recorded a large increase in mining activity over that of 1921, and, as most of the developments are substantial, the future outlook is very encouraging. At present the principal mine in this county is the Idaho Continental, one of the largest lead mines in the State. This mine was idle throughout 1921, but resumed capacity production in 1922. The Idaho Gold & Ruby Mining Co., possibly one of the largest hydraulic plants ever installed in the United States, completed its plant installation and has promised production during the coming year. The new mill constructed by the Cynide Gold Mining Co. represents the largest new mine plant installation in the State. The activities of this company and its possibilities are adding considerable to mining activity in Boundary County. The principal mineral resources and the most extensive mining operations in this county are found at the large limestone quarries at Arco operated by the Amalgamated Sugar Company and the Utah-Idaho Sugar Company. These two quarries, which were operated for about eight months during the year, produced a large tonnage of lime rock and employed approximately 60 men. The limestone is of such fine quality that both of these companies closed down their other quarries and now get all the rock used in their Idaho and Utah sugar factories from the mines at Arco. This change greatly increased the production from the Arco quarries, thus adding to the county's activities and production. CAMAS COUNTY

CARIBOU COUNTY

The principal mineral resource of this county is the high grade phosphate rock which is widely distributed over a large area.

The mineral springs at Soda Springs constitute an important resource which is lying dormant. These springs have exceptional medicinal qualities, are excellent for table use, and offer a great possibility if properly developed and exploited.

Native sulphur is found in numerous places in the county. Many of these deposits are high grade and are deserving of more attention than they have received in the past.

The only salt found in the State is in this county. In early days the salt springs on Tygee and Stump Creeks were utilized as a source of salt, but since the advent of the railroads the use of these springs has been discontinued. The well being sunk by the Wallace Wyoming Oil Company has proved that the salt springs are underlaid with a massive layer of rock salt.

A number of structures favorable to the commercial accumulation of oil and gas are found in the eastern part of this county. The recent bulletin issued by the Idaho Bureau of Mines and Geology contains a large amount of valuable information relative to the oil and gas possibilities. The Wallace Wyoming Oil Company is pioneering in this field and the outcome of its operations is looked forward to with great expectancy.

The Anaconda Copper Mining Company completed installation of its mine and mill plant, which makes it the largest industrial establishment of its kind in the United States. During 1922 the company shipped a small tonnage for experimental purposes. It is now in a position to maintain capacity production whenever freight rates and prices justify.

The resources of this county, although essentially different from those of most other counties of the State, are very valuable and when opened up and properly exploited will be a material factor in the prosperity of Caribou County and the State.

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CUSTER COUNTY

Custer, essentially a mining county and one of the largest mineral producers in the State, has a greater variety of minerals than any other county, the principal ones being: copper, gold (both placer and lode), silver, lead, zinc, molybdenum, tungsten, quicksilver, manganese, iron ore, antimony, and limestone, mentioned in the order of their prominence.

The Empire mine at Mackay, owned by the Idaho Metals Company, is the largest copper mine in the State, both in production and extent of underground workings. This mine, which has been a producer for over 20 years, is operated under the leasing system. Capacity production was maintained throughout 1922 at the rate of about 40 carloads per month. The large amount of development work done during the year greatly increased the ore reserves, as well as proving the further extent of the ore at depth, particularly in the Cossack tunnel.

In addition to being the largest copper producer, Custer County is also an important producer of lead and silver. The Ramshorn is essentially a silver mine, and one of the largest in the State. During 1922 capacity production was maintained. The extensive development work done greatly increased the ore reserves, which will assure the property a long life. The lead mines at Mackay, particularly the Horse Shoe Copper Company, the Anderson lease and the Blue Jay lease, recorded a very large lead production. All of these mines have substantial showings and their total production averaged about a car per day. The Red Bird, at Clayton, being operated by the Idaho Mine Development Company, greatly increased its production over that of the previous year; and the development work done materially increased the possibilities of this famous old producer. The Huffman lease, on the Beardsley group at Bay Horse, added to the lead production of Custer County.

The acquisition of the Livingston mine on Railroad Ridge by the Livingston Mines Corporation gives this county a new camp and a new mine. This company has undertaken an extensive development and construction campaign, which will add to the prosperity of the county and its future production. The operations at the Bruno, South Butte and Red Bird added considerable to the activities on Squaw Creek; these, with the prospecting work being done at the Phi Kappa, Charles Dickens, Niagara, and the work of the Sawtooth Dredging Company, all added materially to the activities of the county during 1922. 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ELMORE COUNTY

The new dredge of the South Park Dredging Co. started digging on August 21, 1922, an important date for Elmore County and the State, as it represents the completion of one of the largest installations of its kind in the State, and an activity that adds greatly to the prosperity of this county, as well as being a material factor in attracting attention to its mineral resources and possibilities.

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FREMONT COUNTY

The limited amount of prospecting that has been done in the northeast corner of this county has proven that considerable commercial coal exists. These coal beds are so far removed from transportation that they cannot be profitably exploited at the present time, but will eventually prove to be an important economic factor in the eastern part of the State.

Phosphate rock and oil shale deposits occur in a number of places, as well as magnesite and asbestos. These deposits have never been sufficiently developed to prove their extent, although worthy of investigation.

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GEM COUNTY

The continued lethargy in gold mining is still apparent in this county and the activities that were anticipated did not materialize, particularly in the Pearl (West View) district, which at one time was an important producer. Practically all of the old mines of this district were idle and no new undertakings were started during 1922. The sulphide ores of this district are amenable to treatment and many of the deposits are worthy of development. Considerable mining has been done on Squaw Creek, and in the past this district had a substantial production. The principal resources of these districts are: gold, silver, lead, zinc, and copper.

This county justifies more extensive exploitations and investigations than it has been receiving.

IDAHO COUNTY

Idaho County is one of the largest counties in the State in area, population, agricultural development, and extent of mineral resources. Its mineral resources are varied and diverse, being principally: Gold (placer and lode), silver, copper, lead, zinc, antimony, tungsten, monazite, rutile, asbestos, coal, and marble; the largest and most important of which is gold. At one time this county was a large gold producer, and within its borders lie the greatest undeveloped gold mining sections of any equal area in the United States.

Many fortunes have been made from the rich placer deposits of the Florence, Elk City, Newsome, Golden, Orogrande, Dixie, and Warren districts. The greater part of these placers that could be hydraulicked is exhausted, but in many of them large areas of land suitable for dredging are still available. Throughout these districts are numerous gold bearing veins; many of these veins carry free milling gold; others are free milling only for a limited distance near the surface; and a great many are base. Many plants have been built throughout the county on the assumption that all of the ore was amenable to free milling methods. These plants are monuments to the memory of improper direction and not to the failure of the properties. Many large deposits of low grade gold ore, which are amenable to modern metallurgical methods have been developed; these lack only proper direction, financing, and good roads to bring them to profitable production.

The lack of suitable roads is particularly evidenced by the inactivities of the Elk City, Newsome, Ten Mile, Orogrande, Dixie and Buffalo Hump districts. When these districts are served by a road that will permit economical transportation, their development will be rapid and profitable. The new road from Grangeville up the South Fork of the Clearwater River, which has been started and on which over a quarter of a million dollars has been spent, is one of the most worthy road projects started in the State in recent years and should be completed without undue delay. This road, beside opening up the resources of these districts, will be a necessary aid to the protection of the vast timber area through which it passes; will make accessible to the public a large playground of wonderful scenic beauty, in which are natural hot springs and unsurpassed hunting and fishing; and will mean a saving to the postal service of thousands of dollars each year through the reduction in the cost of transporting the mails.

During 1922 the principal gold mining operations were those of the Unity Gold Mines Co., and the Homestake Gold Mining Co., but a large number of the smaller operators greatly increased their activities over those of the previous year. The Harpster district had two companies actively engaged in development work, and two companies developing coal prospects were active throughout the year. These operations and the increase in prospectors and investigators looking for new properties, gave the county a considerable increase in activity over 1921. The principal outstanding events were the acquisition of the Walker-Wilcox group by E. E. Carter and associates, and the new gold discovery in the Dixie district.

The large low grade free milling gold deposits, the available dredging ground, the other mineral resources, the many undiscovered veins, and the abundant amount of available hydroelectric power makes this county an exceptional field.

LEMHI COUNTY

Of all the counties in the State there is none with more varied resources, both mining and agricultural, than Lemhi. In this vast mountainous area are many streams and rivers flowing through broad, flat valleys where agriculture in all its different branches is profitably pursued. The crops varying from those that can be raised only at high altitude to those of a few feet above sea level. The mountains are comprised of practically all kinds of rocks ranging from early sedimentary to late igneous and include many altered phases of each. The different rocks are widely distributed through the entire area, and the diversity of the mineral resources is extensive as each particular variety of rock generally harbors a different mineral or minerals. The principal ones, in the order of their prominence are: lead, copper, silver, gold, zinc, tungsten, cobalt, nickel, molybdenum, manganese, coal, limestone, building stone and tin.

Lemhi has always been one of the most important mining counties in the State, its activities dating from the discovery in the early sixties of the rich placer deposits in the Blackbird, Gravel Range, Mackinaw, Carmen Creek, Kirtley Creek, Eldorado, and Pratt Creek districts to the present day operations of the deep lode mines, which are found in practically all of the many mining districts. Gold mining being unprofitable and lead and copper demanding low prices during 1921, the lowest production record for many years was had; but in 1922 the advance in value of the latter metals had a stimulating effect and this year witnessed a large increase in mining activities and production.

The mines in the Gilmore section, particularly those of the Pittsburgh-Idaho Co. and Latest Out Mining & Smelting Co., Ltd., are holding up under deep development; and their ore reserves and production were greatly augmented.

The Harmony Mines Co., whose property was closed down throughout 1921, resumed operations early in 1922 and maintained practically capacity production throughout the year. This mine is the largest copper producer and the most completely equipped property in Lemhi County. The Pope-Shenon mine, which has been closed down for a number of years, was leased to George A. and William M. Snow, who rearranged the mill and immediately put the property on a producing basis. These properties are the only ones operating throughout the extensive belt on which they are located. The area within which these mines are found will eventually become an important copper producing section.

During the year a small amount of prospecting and development was done in the Junction district, particularly at the lead mines near Leadore. These deposits are large shear zones, carrying a small percentage of lead and silver, and lack only proper direction, financing, and power; and when so equipped this district will be a large producer.

Considerable prospecting and development work was done in the Spring Mountain and Viola districts. A few carloads of ore were shipped and a number of very important new discoveries were made. These operations greatly increased the activity of the districts mentioned; some of the new disclosures appear to be substantial; and the increased interest shown indicates that the coming year will witness a large amount of new developments.

Gold mining remained quiet in this county throughout 1922, although more interest was evidenced than was shown in 1921, particularly in the Leesburg, Gibbonsville and Shoup districts, and on Big Eight Mile in the Junction district.

The discoveries in the new camp named Silverton, which is four miles east of Salmon on Jesse Creek, were actively developed; a small car of ore was shipped, and the indications are such that in all probability the county has a new district that will be of considerable importance in its future prosperity.

The extensive and varied resources, which are distributed over a large area; the many veins that have been discovered and developed; the many possibilities for new discoveries; together with the excellent mining conditions, make Lemhi County a very attractive field for the prospector or operator.

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OWYHEE COUNTY

The large placer deposits discovered in 1863 first attracted attention to this county. A stampede followed; in a short time the Silver City district was thickly settled; and the discovery of the quartz veins resulted shortly afterward. The placer deposits were soon exhausted and the rich quartz veins then received attention. The ore found was the richest gold-silver ore ever discovered in the State, and many tons of it that had a phenomenal value were shipped. These mines were the first deep mines to be operated in the State, and for many years Owyhee County was a great producer of gold and silver. Early day records are such that the statistics on production are not very reliable, but from the best sources available an estimated production of over \$40,000,000 is conservative.

During late years, on account of adverse gold mining conditions, this county has been very inactive, although 1922 witnessed a small increase over the previous year. The principal operators were: the leasers at the Alpine and Trade Dollar; the Never Sweat, Great Western, Red Jacket and Demming companies; and the Flint, Ruth, and Pauper mines. The most important results from these developments were the discoveries at the Never Sweat and the Ruth. These appear to be substantial and are having their influence in attracting attention to the Silver City district.

All of the high grade ore in the mines of this county has not been exhausted, nor have all of the veins been discovered. To those looking for opportunities along these lines this county is worthy of investigation.

SHOSHONE COUNTY

In area Shoshone County is one of the largest counties in the State, covering approximately 2600 square miles. The entire county is mountainous, containing but a limited area of agricultural land, and is entirely dependent upon the mining and timber industries. These two industries are of such magnitude and importance that this county is one of the wealthiest in the State. Lying approximately in the geographical center of the county is the famous Coeur d'Alene district, a district with undefined boundaries, but containing an area of approximately 400 square miles and known throughout the world as one of the largest lead-silver producing regions in the United States. For many years this district has yielded approximately 90 per cent of the lead and 85 per cent of the silver mined in Idaho. In addition to lead, silver and zinc Shoshone County produces a considerable amount of copper and in the past has produced antimony and tungsten. These metals and gold (both placer and lode) constitute the principal mineral resources. The year 1922 witnessed a great revival of mining, as all of the large mines as well as many small development companies that were idle throughout 1921 resumed operations. Many new companies were organized and commenced operations, prospecting increased, and a general spirit of optimism was manifested throughout the year.

The principal factors contributing to the marked increase in mining and resumption of operation by the large mines which were closed down were the repeal of the excess profit tax; reduction in freight rates; the increase in metal prices, particularly lead and zinc; and the increase in wages paid throughout the district.

The principal new discoveries and new developments that promise to give this county additional mines of importance and which have had a stimulating effect on development and prospecting are the following:

During the year the Western Union Mining Co. took control of its mine which had been opened by leasers, many of whom made small fortunes during the past few years. The company at once commenced an active development campaign which disclosed a large amount of ore. This ore has been proven to extend in depth and the present condition of the mine indicates that it is permanent; and there seems to be no question that this property will soon become one of the principal mines of the Coeur d'Alene district.

The property which has been developed by the Galena Mining Co. for the past two years responded in excellent shape to the extensive development campaign that was undertaken. The extent of the ore bodies was further demonstrated and a tonnage of ore, sufficient in quantity to assure the district and the county a new dividend payer, has been blocked out. This company was consolidated with the Callahan Zinc-Lead Co., and with this strong financial interest back of it there is no question about the future life of the property.

The prospecting work of the Lookout Mountain Mining Co. further proved the extent of the ore bodies as well as demonstrating the fact that deeper development is warranted. Plans for driving a lower tunnel were completed, the outcome of which in all probability will add another new and important mine to this county.

One of the most important discoveries was that of the new ore body in the Success mine. This new shoot was sufficiently explored to prove that it is of considerable magnitude and this mine experienced a phenomenal revival.

The property of the Big Creek Mining Co., Ltd., was taken over by the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co., which immediately commenced an extensive development campaign which resulted in some very important disclosures. The fact that this strong company has taken control indicates that the property has merit and will in all probability soon be classed as one of the important mines of the district.

The ore bodies on the lower level of the Hecla have been proven to be larger and more extensive than in any other part of the mine and the new discoveries made by this company on the Wide West claim, which was recently acquired from the Federal Mining & Smelting Co., were of sufficient importance to indicate that the resources of this company have been greatly augmented.

The developments of the Sunshine Mining Co. proved this property to be substantial. Production was greatly increased and it is becoming recognized as one of the new mines.

The ore bodies in the Star mine have been sufficiently proven to satisfy the present owner, the Sullivan Mining Co., that they constitute a mine of importance. However, production from this property must wait until the famous Star crosscut is completed, which should be during 1923.

The development work that progressed throughout the year at the property of the Independence Lead Mines, Ltd., further proved the extent of the ore bodies.

The disclosures made and the development work done by the Cedar Creek Mining & Development Co., Ltd., proved a large tonnage of sufficient extent to justify the statement that this was one of the principal new mines to "come in" during the year, and that it lacks only a mill to become a producer. This property is located in the territory commonly referred to as the "North Side" and is of considerable importance as it proves the worthiness of that section.

A discovery of considerable importance and one which will probably give the Coeur d'Alene district a new producer early in 1923 was that of the leasers at the old Argentine mine. A large tonnage of ore has been proven; extensive development is under way; equipment was being added during the closing months of the year to expedite the handling of the ore; and plans for milling the ore at one of the mills in the district were completed.

The commercial ore found at a depth of 1800 ft. in the long crosscut tunnel of the Montana-Idaho Copper Co. in the St. Regis district is holding up under exploration and appears to be substantial and lacks only further prospecting to determine its extent.

The most important installations and new plants constructed in the Coeur d'Alene district were those of the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co. consisting of the completion of the company's new South Mill which greatly adds to the concentrating capacity, a new auxiliary power plant, a new electric hoist for the White Raise, and a new sampling mill at the smelter.

The Federal Mining & Smelting Co. rehabilitated its hydroelectric power plants which had been idle for a number of years and commenced rebuilding its Morning mill. The improvements being added to the Morning mill constitute radical changes in present ore-dressing methods and will represent one of the most advanced steps that has been taken in many years.

The Hecla Mining Co. reconstructed and greatly enlarged its surface mining plant.

The equipment in the mill of the National Mining Co. was rearranged and sufficiently modified to permit treatment of the tailings from the Gold Hunter Mining & Smelting Co.

The Paragon Mining Co. rebuilt its mill, changed the flow sheet and added a flotation unit.

The research work in electrolytic smelting of lead and zinc ore conducted by the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining & Concentrating Co. during the year terminated in gratifying results. The company's 10-ton pilot plant proved that the methods employed were successful, and the construction of a 30-ton plant for the treatment of lead-silver ore on a commercial basis was started. This plant should be completed and in operation in the early part of 1923. The outcome of the operations of this new method is looked forward to with expectancy, as it will probably prove to be of invaluable assistance to the state and the mineral producers in general, as it is such a marked advance in the metallurgical treatment of base ores that its successful outcome may be revolutionary.

The extensive development work done by practically all of the large operators in the lower levels of their mines during the year proved their ore bodies to be more extensive and of higher grade than in the upper levels. The many properties that have the indication of becoming large mines; the many prospects that are being developed, and the other properties that are worthy of development, together with the large operating mines assure Shoshone County a permanent mining industry for many years.

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TETON COUNTY

The largest beds of minable coal found in Idaho are located in Teton County. These deposits have been developed in a small way though not sufficiently to prove their number and extent. The beds vary in thickness from 1 to 11 feet, and the coal is of high quality, excellent for domestic and industrial purposes, and is exceptionally adaptable for powdered coal. These deposits have been examined by members of the U. S. Geological Survey; and the U. S. Bureau of Mines, in cooperation with the University of Idaho, and their reports contain estimates of an immense tonnage of available coal.

For a number of years a small amount of coal has been produced for local consumption, and during the war a branch railroad 7 miles in length was constructed to the mine. At that time the property was actively operated, but owing to mismanagement the development work done was of no practical value and the mines were forced to close down. During 1921 the Gem State Coal Co. commenced active operations under a lease, but in 1922 the bond-holders brought foreclosure proceedings which resulted in the lease being cancelled.

When these coal properties are properly financed and managed they will become of great economic importance in the development of southern Idaho.

The other mineral resources of this county are phosphate rock, gold, tripoli and bentonite. These are worthy of investigation as well as the many structures favorable for the accumulation of commercial oil which are also found in this county.

The coal deposits and oil possibilities are fully described in the references listed under "Bibliography."

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WASHINGTON COUNTY

This county has two districts in which considerable mining has been done—Washington and Heath—the principal one being the Washington or Mineral district. At one time this district was a large producer of silver, two blast furnaces were in operation and the camp of Mineral was a good sized town; but the town has been deserted for many years, the smelters have been dismantled and the camp reverted to its primitive condition. Practically all of the deposits are high grade silver-copper ores, rather complex, but amenable to modern metallurgical methods. Many of the deposits are extensive, a considerable tonnage of ore is available, and there seems to be no reason why this district should not be receiving more attention than it has during the past two years, as there are many properties that are worthy of investigation and development.

The ores of the Heath district are principally copper. When copper demanded a high price this district received considerable attention, but when the mining of this metal became unprofitable all activities were suspended and during 1922 no active operation was resumed.

The principal minerals found in the county mentioned in the order of their prominence are: silver, copper, gold, lead, zinc, iron ore, manganese, diatomaceous earth and clay. Many of the deposits carrying these minerals warrant greater attention than they have received in the past.

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1922 METAL PRODUCTION

The total value of all lead, silver, gold, copper and zinc mined and marketed in Idaho during 1922 was \$19,196,403.71, an increase in value of \$2,632,389.12 over the production of 1921 which was \$16,564,014.59. The production of copper and zinc had a decided increase; gold decreased; lead and silver remained about the same although slightly less as the reopening of the large mines, which were idle during 1921, and the increase in production by those which continued operations, was not sufficient to overcome the deficiency caused by the curtailed output during the first six months of the year.

The advances in the price of lead, zinc and copper; the reduction in freight rates and commodities; and an improved labor situation were responsible for the resumption of operations by all of the mines which were idle during 1921. The Pitman act greatly stimulated the production of silver and was entirely responsible for the continuous operation of many large producers. Gold mining continued to be unprofitable and unless some relief is had in the near future the only gold of any consequence produced in Idaho will be that contained in the ores of lead and copper. Shoshone county maintained its position as the premier producing county in the State, with a total production valued at \$16,182,-010.61 or 84.29 per cent of the total State production. Blaine County, which was the second largest producer in 1921 lost its position in 1922 to Custer County by a margin of \$39,853.20, so takes third place for this year. Lemhi County, the fourth in rank in 1921 lost its position to Bonner County and went into fifth place with Boundary County as sixth. The increase in Bonner County is attributed principally to the operations of the Talache Mines, Inc., and the increase in Boundary County to the resumption of The Idaho Continental Co.

Gold

The 1922 output of gold totaled 22,178.39 ounces valued at \$458,427.32. In 1921 the output was 26,750.76 ounces valued at \$552,938.23; or a loss of \$94,410.91. This is the least production ever recorded in the history of the State and is significant in emphasizing the lethargy in gold mining that existed throughout the year. Particularly so as a large part of the production was recovered as a by-product of other metals. Boise County continued to hold first rank in gold production with Shoshone County second, although both had a considerable decrease, while the operations of the new dredges in Elmore and Clearwater Counties added two new sources of production.

Silver

The 1922 production of silver was 6,149,336.15 ounces and in 1921 it was 6,184,989.73 ounces; a decrease of 35,654 ounces. The 1922 silver production of Shoshone County was 4,697,517.74 ounces, 76.39 per cent of the total for the State, and a decrease of 434,802 ounces as compared with 1921. Blaine was the only other county to show a decrease while Bonner and Custer recorded a marked increase. The principal silver producing counties, for the year, mentioned in the order of their prominence are Shoshone, Blaine, Bonner, Custer, Lemhi, and Boundary. The Pitman act, which fixed the price of silver at \$1 an ounce, kept many mines in operation throughout the year and at the termination of its provisions during 1923 a large number of mines will be compelled to close unless some relief is given in the meantime.

Lead

The value of the 1922 output of lead was \$11,762,302.60 and the 1921 output was \$9,559,558.85. The 1922 production was 205,132,588 pounds and the 1921 was 210,100,194 pounds; a decrease of 4,967,606 pounds but an increase in value of \$2,202,743.75 due to the increase in the price of lead from an average price per pound in 1921 of 4.55 cents to 5.734 cents in 1922.

Zinc

The production of recoverable zinc increased from 1,818,313 pounds in 1921 to 5,596,514 pounds in 1922. All of the zinc produced throughout the year was marketed during November and December so the average price of 7.052 cents for these months was used in valuing the output.

The total value of the zinc produced during 1922 was \$394,666.17 or an increase of \$300,600.00 over that of 1921. Shoshone was the only county producing zinc ore during the year.

Copper

The production of copper in 1922 was 3,225,762 pounds valued at \$431,671.47 with an average price of 13.382 cents for the year. Compared with 1921 the total production was 1,380,168 pounds valued at \$172,521.00 with an average value of 12.50 cents per pound; showing an increase for 1922 of 1,845,594 in pounds and \$259,150.00 in value.

Statistics

The compilation of the mineral production for 1922 is the gross metal content of all the ores or bullion produced and marketed during the year with the values figured from the average New York quotation.

The tabulation presented below represents the production reported to the inspector's office and constitutes the most complete and accurate statistics for any one year ever compiled by this office and is not in error to exceed 1 per cent of the total State production.
